### **Tracking Your Grade**

- You have access to your grades at all times through *Gradebook* on MyCR under our class site. This is updated as soon as assignments are graded and entered.
- Instructor also keeps another set of books and will send you this version periodically through the e-mail address you provide on the first day of class.
- The highest grade between the two gradebook versions will determine your semester grade.

#### **Grading Criteria**

- Projects come with specific written grading criteria. (see Project Packet)
- Classwork is graded on completeness and quality of work and student participation. Classwork points will vary (5-30 points) depending on assignments, which will include active learning: quizzes, group work, class discussions, reading, and written work. Average is approximately 10 points per class. Classwork cannot be made up, so missed classwork will receive a zero (Note that two lowest 5-10 pt. assignments are dropped). Excused absences require medical or legal documentation—no exceptions.
- Homework is graded on completeness and quality of work. Homework points will vary—see Course Schedule for breakdown. Late homework is not accepted; therefore, homework not turned in on time will receive a zero. This means that if you are absent, your missed homework <u>will not be automatically accepted</u> upon your return to class. (Note that the lowest 5 pt. assignment is dropped). A student should turn in homework ahead of time if he/she has a planned absence. (NOTE: Instructor arrangement <u>required</u> for any other special circumstance.) Homework is on your Course Schedule, will be announced in each class, and posted and updated on MyCR under Calendar. Homework is due at the START of class – 3:30 p.m. Sharp.
- Tests Two Review tests of 50 points each (and one End-of-Year Class Assessment of an easy 15 points) are graded on completeness and quality of work.

### **Absences and Participation**

Since regular attendance is a critical factor in student success, students at the College are expected to attend all sessions of each class in which they are enrolled. In general, absences may be considered excessive when the number of absences exceeds the total number of times that the class meets during one week. For instance, this course meets two days a week, so any more than two absences for the semester would be considered "excessive". While **an instructor may drop a student for excessive absences** up until October 31, it is the student's responsibility to officially withdraw from a class. Instructor approval is not required to withdraw from classes. Students must drop their classes by October 31 through the current registration system.

# The English Department Attendance Policy – Effective as of 8/27/12

Students at the College are expected to attend all sessions of each class in which they are enrolled. For example, if a class meets twice a week, students should not exceed 4 absences for the semester. If a student exceeds the limit on absences before week 11 of the semester, an instructor will notify the student that he or she has been dropped. After that notification, students are still responsible to go into Web Advisor and withdraw themselves from the class, in order not to receive an F. After week 10, excessive absences will likely result in failure.
