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Course Description: English 150 is a course in the development of college-level reading, writing, and critical thinking skills, emphasizing basic argumentation. Students analyze ideas and structure in assigned readings and compose essays supporting arguable thesis statements. The lab component of the course is scheduled in the Writing Lab (DM 2), where students receive individualized instruction in critical reading, in the conventions of standard written English, and in all stages of the writing process.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Develop an effective, thesis-driven argument appropriate to an academic audience.
- 2. Critically read and respond to argumentative texts.
- 3. In a multi-stage process, incorporate feedback (from instructors and peers) in essay planning and drafting.
- 4. Apply basic grammar and punctuation rules, particularly those that address sentence boundaries.

There are no pluses or minuses. There is no extra credit.

- 40% Essays (5 essays, at least 750 words each, with one timed essay)
- 20% Competency Essay (90 minute, in-class essay)
- 10% Portfolio (two revised essays + cover letter)
- 30% Homework, quizzes, tests, quizzes, etc. (cannot be made-up if absent) All essays must be in MLA format and submitted in hard copy. All take-home essays must be posted electronically to Turnitin.com.

Attendance:

You are expected to attend all sessions of each class and lab. You may not miss more than two weeks of class (the equivalent of 4 classes). If you exceed the limit on absences before week 11 of the semester, I will notify you that you have been dropped. After that notification, you still must to go into Web Advisor and withdraw from the class in order not to receive an F.

Repeatability: English 150 may only be attempted three times. Withdrawing after the drop deadline counts as an attempt, as does a D or F grade.
