English 52 involves individualized instruction to help students identify and address needed English skills, such as critical reading, standard written English conventions, and all stages of the writing process. Tutorial support and other resources for reading and writing are provided. NOTE: To earn credit for ENGL 52, students should be co-enrolled in at least one course which requires writing and/or critical reading, so the assignments may provide a focus for tutorial instruction.

Required Texts

There are no required texts for this class, though you will be expected to have access to your CR email account and the MyCR Learning platform.

Course Requirements

Attendance is the number one responsibility you have for this class. Please try to be on time, and be prepared to stay for the entire hour and a half. If you have issues fulfilling this requirement, you place yourself at risk of failing the course. In addition, there will be some minor coursework for this class (journal entries, one short essay). Please complete these assignments and submit them on time.

Expectations

1. To earn credit for English 52, students should be co-enrolled in at least one course which requires writing and/or critical reading, so the assignments may provide a focus for tutorial instruction in arguments, organizing information, developing concrete support, revising, and editing.

2. You should attend class regularly, asking questions, participating in discussion, and demonstrating cooperation with class members in an effort to maturely and intelligently discuss the material. (See "Notes" section below for further information).

3. If you miss or are unable to attend class, it is **your responsibility** to contact me about your absence. I have many students, and my attention will always go first to those who are in class.

Welcome to English 52! I'm excited to be your teacher, and I hope that all of us will enjoy and learn a great deal during this semester. This will be an interesting course because I will be working closely with of each one of you. The primary goals of this course are to help you in preparing and delivering successful writing assignments in the courses you have this semester. In order to do this, we will work together to generate ideas and draft your essays, revise essays for submission and respond to them once they have been graded, and learn how to evaluate our written expressions. The only writing you have to do for this course is a 1-1.5-page reflective essay, due at the end of the semester, and some short email journal entries.

Assignment Requirements

Bi-weekly journal entries will be assigned throughout the semester. Please complete them within one week of receiving them, or you will get zero points for the assignment.
A brief reflective paper is due at the end of the semester. This paper must follow the same manuscript format as my other English classes (see section below).

Manuscript Format

Use Times New Roman font, size 12, double-spaced, .5 inch indentation for paragraphs (no extra spacing between paragraphs), 1 inch margins all around, with page numbers preceded by your last name at top right, all pages stapled. Your name, instructor's name, class, assignment label, date, and word count should be double-spaced and aligned left at top of first page; title is centered.

Office Hours

I will mostly be available in the computer lab Tuesday and Thursday, 4:15-6:05 pm, during my 150 lab and our class time. If needed you may meet me at other times, with or without an appointment, as long as we can make arrangements in advance.
