Course Description and Goals: English 1A Analytical Reading and Writing is a transfer-level course in critical reading and reasoned writing. Students analyze issues and claims presented in visual, oral, or written arguments and write analytical, argumentative essays based on those issues in a critical, strategic manner. Research and source-based writing, and employing correct MLA documentation, is required. Throughout the semester, we will examine the origins of the American Dream and how the American Dream has informed and continues to inform American popular/mainstream culture today. We will carefully read an array of writers from diverse historical, political, social, cultural and economic backgrounds and disciplines. We will then connect, compare and contrast their experiences as "Others" or "minorities" within the American Master Narrative. Throughout this semester, we will strive to develop skills that should help you in future reading and inquiry. The skills you develop to read, think and write critically will be particularly helpful as you continue your studies at College of the Redwoods and in your future education. You will also be reflecting on and exploring your unique

experiences in America and your relationship to the American Dream. What is *your* American Dream? It is my hope that the materials I have chosen for this course will promote an awareness that will inspire positive thoughts and actions towards a collective community and national healing.

Prerequisites: Satisfactory Completion of English 150 (or equivalent) with a C or better, or assessment recommendation for English 1A.

<u>Student Learning Outcomes</u>: By the end of the term, if you have successfully completed the class you should be able to:

- 1) Analyze argumentative claims.
- 2) Respond to arguments with persuasive critical essay.
- 3) Locate, synthesize, and document sources for use in response to arguments.
- 4) Revise and edit for sentence structure and mechanics.

Reading Actively: I have selected texts that I believe should stimulate your minds and give you important insights into critical thinking. I will be asking a good deal of you in your reading. You will need to engage our texts with a spirit of discovery <u>and</u> skepticism. You will also need to be ready to engage in useful discussions and group activities about our readings and the ideas we encounter. I recommend that each of you purchase a separate reading notebook in which you keep notes, thoughts, and ideas for the purpose of preparing for in-class writings and discussion and keeping track of material and ideas you encounter as you engage in research. If you read actively and participate in our class discussions and in your individual groups, you will soon see that the selected texts complement and speak to one another. The central question I will be asking each of you to answer is this: What do these writings, ideas, class discussions, and group presentations lead you to believe? As long as you are actively pursuing your own understanding of the difficult issues we take up, you should have no problem remaining engaged in our class.

Writing Thoughtfully: As for the mechanics and grammar of your writing, since some of you will have excellent skills and others fair to good skills, those of you who have problems will need to spend extra time learning to identify and correct them. I may ask some of you to arrange for individual meetings if your errors persist, but this course is not primarily a course in grammar, punctuation, and mechanics. Throughout the term, we will focus specifically on questions of style and eloquence, but we will also focus on inquiry and argument.

Assignments: Please pay close attention to the Course Schedule in order to keep track of when readings should be done and when writings are due. You will be quizzed on readings, film/media screenings, guest speakers, lectures, research workshops and student presentations. Sometimes we will spend more than one class discussing assigned readings for a specific day, or to finish an in-class activity; therefore, The Course Schedule is subject to change. It is more important that everyone understands the readings and has a chance to fully participate in the in the in-class activities and discussions, rather than charging ahead for the sake of keeping to the specified schedule. Note: All reading assignments must be done before the start of the class listed. All major writing assignments are due at the beginning of class on the day listed. Be sure to come to class prepared for discussion. Brief descriptions of the graded writing assignments follow.

Note: Do not expect to pass this class without submitting and completing every component of all of the major writing assignments. Also, make sure you never give me the only copy of an assignment—it is your responsibility to keep electronic and/or paper backup copies).

Writing Assignments and Presentations: You should always come to class with pen and paper or your reading notebook, and you should always be ready to write. I will usually ask you to write during class. You should definitely take notes on our class discussions, research workshops, lectures, film/media screenings, and guest speakers. Sometimes the writings will seem more like free-writes to generate ideas for class discussion or our Group/Individual Projects. At other times I will ask you to practice concepts of style and sentence construction or academic form such as quoting, citing, or paraphrasing.

You will be working on different kinds of writing projects and presentations this semester. There will be a <u>Group Project Report and Group Project Presentation</u>, and an <u>Individual Research Project Essay</u> and an <u>Individual Project Presentation</u>. <u>The Individual Research Project Essay is divided into THREE parts</u>. <u>There will also be 3 In-Class Writings</u>. The due dates for these writing assignments are as follows:

NOTE: Quizzes CANNOT be made up, EXCEPT if you know you will be missing class, have notified me within at least 24 hours, and have made specific arrangements to take the quiz in advance.

If one or more of your group members do not show up to present, she/he/they will receive a zero for the presentation portion of their Individual Group Project grade(s). I will take such absences into full consideration when I evaluate your Group Presentations. Note: Attempting to postpone your group's presentation date is unfair to the other groups.

Failure to present on the date assigned to you will result in a zero for the presentation portion of your Individual Project grade. Note: Attempting to postpone your presentation date is unfair to the other students.

Check minus=0.5 point (activity is incomplete and/or done incorrectly. Students didn't do some of the assigned readings, and/or came in late/left early)

Check plus=1.5 points (Activity is complete, done correctly& student demonstrates extra effort. At the end of the semester, extra half-points earned for in-class activities will be factored into students' participation grades.)

No credit or absent=0 points (Student didn't do the activity, and/or the readings and/or did not do activity correctly).

• Extra Credit: There will be 3 opportunities to earn extra credit this semester. These opportunities, both on and off campus, will be announced in class and on MYCR. Extra credit

- points earned for extra credit assignments will be distributed accordingly when I determine final grades. NOTE: Extra Credit points WILL NOT be distributed towards Group Projects.
- I have set the following participation policy: Students who miss more than 4 classes within the first 4 weeks of the course will be dropped. If there are valid reasons why you need to miss class or can't make it to class on time, you need to email me and let me know before class meets. If you do not notify me before class meets, I will assume that you don't care about missing class, arriving late or leaving early. If you are consistently late and consistently absent, again, I will assume that you don't care about your participation grade or disrupting our class. Poor attendance and being consistently late or leaving class early on a regular basis means missing significant in-class work, which will certainly lower your participation grade and may cause you to fail. Coming in late and leaving early also constitutes disruptive behavior. It is disrespectful and unfair not only to your instructor, but also to your colleagues who are on time and prepared for class.

<u>Plagiarism:</u> The final research project essay must be posted to **Turnitin.com**. The process is simple and takes only a few minutes. Plagiarism, which is the act of claiming another writer's words or ideas as your own without citing them as a source, is a serious breach of academic conduct and will result in failure of the assignment and possible failure for the course. We will discuss it in detail during the term. If you aren't sure if you're plagiarizing, ask me about it.
