Course Description:

A course using literature as a basis for critical thinking and composition. Students analyze issues, problems, and situations represented in literature and develop effective short and long written arguments (6000 minimum word total) in support of an analysis. This course is designed for those students who seek to satisfy both the full year composition and the critical thinking transfer requirements.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Analyze and employ appeals (e.g. logical, emotional, faulty, etc.) in written texts.
- Write logical, well-developed, thesis-driven essays that respond to questions at issue raised by literary works.
- 3. Locate, evaluate, use, and document evidence from primary and secondary sources (both electronic and print) to support, develop, or validate judgments.
- 4. Identify and evaluate rhetorical and literary devices as representational and persuasive tools.

Required Materials and Texts:

- Into the Wild Jon Krakauer
- Americanah Chimamanda Ngozi Adiche
- They Say/ I Say: Moves that Matter in Academic Writing Graff and Birkenstein
- Readings and Resources that will be posted to our Canvas Site
- Resource material from the Purdue OWL (online)
- Additional research materials that students gather
- Spiral or Composition Notebook (single subj.)

Since much of this material will be online, you will need:

- Reliable and regular access to a computer with Internet capabilities and a printer
- College of the Redwoods email account

Course Prerequisites and Expected Preparation:

- English 1A as a Prerequisite
- English 1B is the second course of a sequence and assumes students are competent in research (both electronic and print), source evaluation, MLA documentation, and analytical argumentation.
- Students should expect to spend a minimum of six hours per week outside of class time drafting and
 revising essays and completing other assignments. Students will produce multiple drafts of writing
 assignments and devote significant time evaluating, synthesizing, and integrating external sources.
- Students should <u>always</u> come to class prepared with access to reading materials and assignments,
- Students should <u>always</u> come to class prepared to engage and contribute to meaningful classroom discussions.

Tardiness and Attendance Policy:

Each day we meet, I will take attendance at the beginning of each class. If you are late for class, you will be marked absent; it is your responsibility to see me immediately after class in order to change your absence to a tardy. Three late arrivals will be considered equivalent to one absence. Students noticeably engaging in behaviors such as sleeping, texting, daydreaming, checking social media, listening to music, reading the newspaper, etc. will be considered absent. As per College of the Redwoods English Department's policy, you may miss up to 4 classes for any reason without penalty; however, missing that much class time is likely to put you behind in completing the coursework.

Late Work and Missed Assignments:

- To receive full credit, assignments must be ready at the beginning of class on the day they are due. Even if you are absent, the assignment is still due at the beginning of class. Turn in the assignment over Canvas and email me if you are unable to appear in class that day.
- Missed in-class exercises and journals cannot be made up.
- For Writing Project assignments, each day that it is late it will receive -.5 points. No coursework will be accepted after the last week of class.
