Course Description

A course in the development of college-level reading, writing, and critical thinking skills, emphasizing basic argumentation. Students analyze ideas and structure in assigned readings and compose essays supporting arguable thesis statements. The lab component of the course is scheduled in the Writing Center, where students receive individualized instruction in critical reading, in the conventions of standard written English, and in all stages of the writing process. A course in the development of college-level reading, writing, and critical thinking skills, emphasizing basic argumentation. Students analyze ideas and structure in assigned readings and compose essays supporting arguable thesis statements. The lab component of the course is scheduled in the Writing Center, where students receive individualized instruction in critical reading, in the conventions of standard written English, and in all stages of the writing process.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Develop an effective, thesis-driven argument appropriate to an academic audience.
- 2. Critically read and respond to argumentative texts.
- 3. In a multi-stage process, incorporate feedback (from instructors and peers) in essay planning and drafting.
- 4. Apply basic grammar and punctuation rules, particularly those that address sentence boundaries.

Class Policies

The English Department Attendance Policy: Attendance is mandatory. Since regular attendance is a critical factor in student success, students at the College of the Redwoods are expected to attend all sessions of each class in which they are enrolled. Census is June 27. If you are not actively participating (attending both class meetings and the writing center hours, turning in assignments) in the class as of that date, you will be dropped. If you are still enrolled after the census, you must continue to attend regularly. Students may not miss more than two weeks of class. For instance, our class meets four days a week; therefore, any more than eight absences for the semester would be considered "excessive." If a student exceeds the limit on absences before Week 5 of the semester, an instructor will notify the student that he or she has been dropped. After that date, excessive absences will likely result in failure. The last date to withdraw from a class is July 24. Also please note, English 150 may only be repeated 3 times. Both failure and withdrawal count as attempts. If you are not here, you cannot learn. If you are absent, you are still responsible for all work that is assigned (check the syllabus). If you are absent on the day an assignment is due, the assignment is considered late. If you are absent on the day the late work is due, then it will not be accepted. I do not accept electronic submissions. You must hand in a print copy of all work.

Canvas: Supplemental materials, information, handouts, are posted on Canvas. Access Canvas by logging in with the first part of your CR email address [BBaggins111] and your birthday [01141981]. This class, and all English classes, use the MLA format for papers. A template for this format is available on Canvas. Download this template and use it for all papers and homework. Please read all announcements and emails from me in a timely manner. Failure to read the messages is not an excuse for not knowing about or fulfilling requirements.

Reading Homework: Read the assignments in a timely and thorough manner. Do the assigned homework in a timely and thoughtful manner to optimize your learning process. All Reading Responses must be at least one page, 250 words, typed double-spaced in the MLA format. In class writings may be handwritten. Late homework must be turned in within one week. After that I will no longer accept it. If you wish to

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revise homework for a better grade, the revision (along with the original graded assignment) must be turned in within a week of the original due date. Please refer to the schedule regularly. Failure to read the schedule is not an excuse for late work. All homework must be typed, double-spaced in the MLA format, in Times Roman 12 font, printed on one side of the page only. Homework that is not in a suitable format will not be accepted.

Essays: Essays must address all parts of the essay assignment, including the prompt, the format, and the minimum page requirements. Essays which do not fulfill the minimum page requirement will not receive full credit. All essays must be typed, double-spaced in the MLA format, in Times Roman 12 font, printed on one side of the page only. Essays that are not in a suitable format will not be accepted. There is a template set up in the MLA format available for download on Canvas. Students must have a writing conference on each essay. You must attach the completed and signed conference form to your final essay. If you do not complete the writing conference requirement, your paper will not be accepted. Failure to plan ahead is not an excuse for not getting a conference. If your paper is late because you did not get your conference in a timely manner, it is your responsibility. All essays must be submitted to turnitin.com. Essays written for English 150 should not include more than 20% source material. Essays that are more than 40% source material will not be accepted. If you do not submit your paper to turnitin, it will not be accepted. If you do not fulfill this requirement, your paper is late. You have one week to turn in a late paper. After that, it will not be accepted. You may revise your paper after getting my approval. If you decide to revise, you must have a plan for revision. You must complete the revision within two weeks of the original due date. Attach the original graded paper to the revision.

Academic Decorum: Be early or on time for class. Come prepared. Take care of personal needs before class. Leaving and reentering the classroom is disruptive, distracting, and disrespectful to others. Please do not walk in front of me when I am talking. If you absolutely must leave briefly, wait until there is an appropriate, non-disruptive moment. If, for a legitimate reason, you must leave class early, you MUST discuss this with me BEFORE class. It is not okay simply to get up and leave the class room. No eating in the classroom. Inappropriate language, cursing, racial, ethnic, sexist, or heterosexist epithets will not be tolerated. No talking is permitted during exams or quizzes. Turn off and put away your cell phones. Do not answer your phone or text in class. Do not leave class in order to answer your phone or text. This is inappropriate behavior. Any type of disruption of the class and the learning process is not permitted. It is against CR policy for unenrolled people to sit in on classes. Please do not bring guests to class. Ask your friends or family to wait for you outside. Please don't put me in the awkward position of asking people to leave. Thank you for your cooperation on this.

Academic Honesty: Students are expected to observe the school policy on cheating and plagiarism. Plagiarism is the act of claiming another writer's work or ideas as your own. Whenever you borrow an idea or a sentence from someone else, you must acknowledge the source. Not properly acknowledging a source is a serious breach of academic conduct. Any student who submits as his or her own work the words or ideas of another writer will fail the assignment and possibly the course. Students are responsible for uploading the formal essays to Turnitin—you submit your paper through Canvas. Go to the Assignment and scroll done to find the upload button. You can do this in the Writing Center or anywhere you have access to the Internet. Essays which contain undocumented source material will receive an F.

Using Sources in English 150: Please do not use internet sources for your papers in this class, unless I specifically suggest you do so. If I do suggest it, I will tell you how to do it correctly. In English 150, we want to rely on our own thinking, observations, and experiences. When you progress into English 1A you will receive in depth instruction on research and using sources appropriately. Remember that turnitin will

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show me any sources you have used. If you commit plagiarism or use a flawed source, it will affect your grade.

<u>Tools for Success</u> Bring notebook, notebook paper, textbook, pen/pencil, and highlighter pens to each class. Download and print the needed materials from Canvas for classroom use. I will not bring extra copies. Be on time. Refer to the syllabus regularly so that you always have the appropriate materials and completed assignments.

Notebooks: Keep your work organized and filed so that you can find your assignments easily. Keep the Syllabus in the front of your notebook and refer to it daily so that you know what assignments are due. The Canvas calendar will have the most up-to-date information on assignments and due dates. Using a three-ring binder and keeping all work filed in your notebook will help keep you organized and facilitate your learning. Complete all assignments in a timely manner to ensure an effective learning experience. Keep all graded work until you receive your final grade. Check your grades on Canvas regularly. Missing or late assignments will be recorded as 0. If you find an error in your grades, bring me the graded assignment as soon as possible so that I can make the correction.

Writing: Start writing assignments immediately, giving yourself plenty of time to complete the entire writing process. Do each part of the assignment when it is due. Seek help when you need it.

Writing Center: Complete your hours in the Writing Center weekly (average of 3 per week). You must receive conferences on thesis, outlines, drafts, and revisions. You will have an opportunity to meet with me one-on-one in order to receive help and clarifications on assignments. Use these hours as well to complete your homework. You can, of course, have multiple conferences on any paper or other assignment. We will be reviewing punctuation in class. If you need extra help, please review the appropriate pages in *Practical Mechanics*, a workbook available at the desk.

Grading: Formal essays will be graded according to the Rubric for English 150 Essays. Keep track of your progress.
