Catalog Description

English 1B is a course using literature as a basis for critical thinking and composition. Students analyze issues, problems, and situations represented in literature and develop effective short and long written arguments (6000 minimum word total) in support of an analysis. This course is designed for those students who seek to satisfy both the full year composition and the critical thinking transfer requirements.

Prerequisite: Passing English 1A (or equivalent course) with a C grade or better is necessary to take English 1B. **Note:** Familiarity and facility with computers and their programs (CR email and Canvas/Microsoft Word/Power Point) is highly recommended!!

Required Texts

Roberts, Edgar V. and Robert Zweig. *Literature: An Introduction to Reading and Writing with NEW MyLiteratureLab -- Access Card Package (10th Edition)*. Boston: Longman, 2012.

Manuscript Format

Use Times New Roman font, size 12, double-spaced, .5 inch indentation for paragraphs (no extra spacing between paragraphs), 1 inch margins all around, with page numbers preceded by your last name at top right, all pages stapled. Your name, instructor's name, class, assignment label, date, and word count should be double-spaced and aligned left at top of first page; title is centered. In general, follow MLA format. See the MLA (orange) section in *The Bedford Handbook*, 9th edition.

Course Overview

Throughout the term emphasis will be placed on understanding the fundamental aspects of literature and argumentation and how they can be applied to writing critical essays with in-text documentation in Modern Language Association format. An in-class essay will also be required. In addition to extensive writing assignments, there will be significant reading. During weeks fifteen and sixteen, students will concentrate on final portfolio preparation. Students should save all written work.

1. Analyze and employ appeals (e.g. logical, emotional, faulty, etc.) in written texts
2. Write logical, well-developed, thesis-driven essays that respond to questions at issue raised by literary works.
3. Locate, evaluate, use, and document evidence from primary and secondary sources (both electronic and print) to support, develop, or validate judgments.
4. Identify and evaluate rhetorical and literary devices as representational and persuasive tools.
