This is an introductory course that offers instruction in expository and argumentative writing, close reading, cogent thinking, research strategies, information literacy, appropriate and effective use of language, and documentation.

Faculty-initiated drop: Missing Numerous Classes or Numerous Assignments by week 5 or week 8

I assess overall class attendance and participation in week 5 and week 8. If you have missed more than 3 classes **or** the majority (55% or more) of the assignments by week 5 or week 8, I will notify you that I intend to drop you from the class. At this point, please contact me so that we can discuss options for you. If I have not received a message from you within 48 hours of my notification, I will drop you from the course.

Expect Grading to be Fair, Consistent, and Clear

Grading rubrics for essays and grading criteria/feedback are used for all other assignments. You should always know why you earned the grade you did, what to strengthen, and what to keep doing. Feedback on strengths is just as important as feedback on areas to improve.

Miscellaneous Classroom Policies:

Food – Food is not permitted in the classroom. Beverages are allowed so long as they are in a container that will not spill (has a lid). If someone has a medical condition that requires eating during class, please contact me privately in order to make an accommodation.

Leaving the classroom — please do not leave the classroom once the class has started. If it is an emergency and you must leave, please do so discretely without disrupting the rest of the class, and re-enter class discreetly as well. Please attend to restroom needs prior to the start of class. Leaving class regularly for the restroom or refilling water bottles is disruptive for you and others. If you anticipate needing to leave because of an ongoing condition, please speak with me about this. If you decide to leave class early, it will be considered ½ an absence; if you leave during independent

work time during class, you will receive ½ an absence. If you arrive more than 15 minutes late, you will receive ½ an absence.
