## **Evaluation & Grading Policy**

### Students must earn a final grade of 70 percent in the co-requisite English 1A lecture course to pass the lab.

This lab is a pass/no pass lab. Passing this lab is contingent upon regular weekly attendance and engagement in activities designed to help students develop their work and assignments for English 1A. Students earn 10 points during each lab session, and need to earn a total of 80 or more points out of a possible 120 points for participation in lab to earn credit. That means it is important to not miss more than 4 labs this semester.

The final course grade in English 1A includes all the required reading and writing assignments as well as your preparedness, engagement, in-class work, contributions to discussion, and collaboration. Weekly attendance in the lab is required to work on and help support assignments, reading, and writing assigned in English 1A.
