- Strike One: Regardless of your intent to plagiarize or not, you will rectify the problem within one week of the original assignment due date. You will receive a grade of no greater than 80% on the Final Draft.
- Strike Two: You will rewrite the entire paper within one week of the original assignment due date. You will use no materials from the original paper. You will start over from scratch. You will receive no greater than an 80% on the Final Draft of the paper.
- Strike Three: I will seek to drop you from my course.

## Gender-Inclusive Language

# How can we get a good grade in this class?

From "A Unilateral Grading Contract to Improve Learning and Teaching"

"You [have earned and] are guaranteed a B if you:

- participate in class regularly and stay in reasonable contact with students and instructor
- meet due dates and writing criteria for all major assignments
- participate in all exercises and activities
- complete all informal, low stakes writing assignments (e.g. journal writing or discussion-board writing)
- give thoughtful peer feedback during class workshops and work faithfully with your group on other collaborative tasks (e.g., sharing papers, commenting on drafts, peer editing, on-line discussion boards, answering peer questions)
- sustain effort and investment on each draft of all papers
- make substantive revisions when the assignment is to revise—extending or changing the thinking or organization—not just editing or touching up
- copy-edit all final revisions of main assignments until they conform to the conventions of edited, revised English
- attend conferences with the teacher to discuss drafts
- submit your [...] final [project].

Thus you earn the grade of B entirely on the basis of what you do—on your conscientious effort and participation. The grade of B does not derive from my judgment about the quality of your writing. Grades higher than B, however, do rest on my judgment of writing quality. To earn higher grades you must produce writing—particularly for your final portfolio—that I judge to be exceptionally high quality."

When you turn in an assignment, expect to receive your essay score within one week of submission. For example, if you turn in your essay on a Monday, you will get it back on a Monday.

## How can we be successful, overall, in this class?

- Turn in your work.
- Study on your own.
- Check Canvas and your CR Email every day.
- Ask questions.
- Interact with other students.
- Engage with the language.
- Read your essay through aloud at least one time and make changes and revisions before turning in your Final Draft.

## **Graded Assignments**

All assignments in this course will contribute to your grade. Here are our primary graded assignments in more detail:

20% Readings and MRLs: Below are the assignments in this group on Canvas.

- Readings: We will have reading(s) due every few weeks.
- Meta-cognitive Reading Logs (MRL): You will do an MRL for every content reading. Links to MRLs are on Canvas, in the same assignment page as the reading they are associated with. You can fill out MRLs on your computer, download and print MRLs, or you can simply make one in your notebook and upload a photo or scan. Please put the information that belongs on the front of the MRL on the "first" page of your notebook, and the information that belongs on the back of the MRL on the back of that page.

**20% Discussions:** Discussions include three different assignments each week, but you will only do one of those three each week. One week you will compose a piece of writing, and the next week you might compose a different piece of writing, or a response to another person's piece of writing. Read the next part for more details.

All Discussions will be posted in a Canvas Discussion Forum, so that everyone can see them. If I have feedback, I will post that privately to you. No other students will ever see my feedback to you, unless it's to point out what a good job you did, and how they should look to your post for an example of what to do to be successful.

Each week, in addition to reading and viewing materials, you will be responsible to do just **one** of the following two assignments:

- Post a question from your MRL to the Forum by Thursday. The question must be interesting, related to the reading, and generate more questions (meaning, do not write a question that can be answered with "yes" or "no"). Most good questions start with "why" or "how". Explain why you are asking this question, how the question came up for you, and how you feel the question connects to the reading (200 300 words).
- Post a response to a question posed by another student by Sunday. The answer should include a
  quotation from the reading to support your claim (250 500 words).
- Post a reading journal in which you have "had a conversation" with the text. Essentially, these are
  your thoughts as you are reading. Some questions to help guide you are
  - "What kinds of things were happening in your mind as you read this?"
  - "What did you do that helped you to understand the reading?"
  - "What questions or problems did you have while reading? How did you overcome them, or how will you grapple with these problems in the future?"

These assignments will rotate. I will **do my best effort** to make sure that **each student does each assignment an equal number of times**.

**20% Writing Assignments:** There are nine writing assignments due over the course of the semester. Each is graded on a rubric (available for students to view at any time on Canvas). Below are the assignments in this group on Canvas. Writing Assignments will consist of a **prompt** you must respond to. Sometimes you may have a choice of prompts. The purpose of reading, completing MRLs, and completing Textbook Readings and Activities (described below) is to **build toward** the Writing Assignment and Essays (described below). This means that every assignment you do in class will be in some way contributing toward aiding you in finishing these assignments.

**20% Textbook Readings and Activities:** Our textbook is pretty interesting. It's well-written, and accessible. More than that, though, it costs money. I don't know about you, but I loathe wasting money. I don't have much of it, and I'd prefer to only spend money on something I'm going to make use of, *especially* for school or work.

In the interest of that, I have chosen a textbook and worked the assignments/activities in the textbook into the course wherever is possible. This means that **by doing textbook assignments** you are also **building toward doing Writing Assignments and Essays** (explained below). Most of the time, Textbook Readings and Activities are short, extremely informal writing assignments. Think of them as pre-writing and rough drafts for Writing Assignments, while your Writing Assignments are rough drafts of your Essays.

Some Textbook Activities may take longer to complete, so I have split those into two weeks (though you are always welcome to submit early). These are clearly labelled.

**20% Essays:** Throughout the semester, you will complete 4 Essays, including the Final Essay. The goal of any academic writing course is to **help students understand**, **improve**, **and become more proficient at reading and writing in an academic context**. However, though many of you will never become English majors, any major you decide to engage in will require academic writing, and any job, career or profession you go on to pursue will require you to read, think and write critically (the **number one** complaint from bosses currently is new hires' lack of writing and communication skills. Also, it's **a big** complaint about bosses from employees as well—that they cannot write clearly!)

Good academic writing's goal is to solve problems, so in our class, all of your essays will focus on defining and explaining the severity of a problem, and offering solutions to that problem. Sometimes you will need to compare and contrast, sometimes you will need to define and classify, but your essays will always be **argumentative** and they will always **be about practical things**.

#### **Below 70% Procedures**

What if I have below a 70% in your class?

Follow these steps:

Make an appointment with me before October 25th, 2020. Visit with me and discuss your options.

Go see your Financial Aid advisor before October 30th, 2020 to discuss your unique financial situation.

Follow up with me before October 30th, 2020. We will go from there.

What if I didn't do any of that above, it's April 2nd, and I'm failing your class?

Follow these steps:

Go see your Financial Aid advisor to discuss your unique financial situation.

Follow their advice with regards to dropping the class, or staying in the class.

If you make no attempt to contact me, or follow up with me regarding your status in the class on or before October 30th, 2020, and you have a 65% or below, I will drop you from the course by Fall Break.

### **Late Ticket Policy**

I get it. Stuff happens. You may turn in **1 of any assignment** late throughout the semester (that means one of each from the 5 kinds of assignments listed above under "Graded Assignments". This means you can turn in 5 total assignments late throughout the semester without incurring any kind of penalty). **This excludes the Final Project. You must turn that in on time.** 

But if you want to "use a late ticket" you must follow the procedure!

Here is how this procedure works:

- Contact me at least 48 hours before the due date (48 hours as in Business Hours. Don't contact me on Saturday about an assignment due that Monday. Contact me on Thursday about an assignment due that Monday).
- Tell me you need to use a late ticket. Include the name of the assignment and the original due date in your email.
- I will email you back with further instructions. Usually, I will give you another 48 business hours to complete the assignment, but depending on your specific situation, I may implement another policy.

I have other classes, students, duties and responsibilities aside from this class. I cannot be grading late papers and assignments my whole life. Late policies are not to punish students who also have responsibilities, duties, jobs, and family outside of class, they are to protect my sanity and hold students accountable.

What if I forgot to tell you I needed to turn it in late?

Then you did not meet the assignment requirements.

Can I turn in the Final Project late?

No.
