Course Requirements

<u>Essay Writing</u>: three out-of-class, formal essays of 1000-2000 words. (Note: these essays will advance in point value from 50-100-200.) Each essay must include a pre-write and at least two drafts (Rough/Final). Please save all work that goes into your papers! In addition, we will have at least two scored timed essays using the University of California Subject A Format before the final written exam. These will also advance in value, the last being worth about 40% more.

Expectations

- 1. You should attend class regularly, asking questions, participating in discussion, and demonstrating cooperation with class members to discuss the material maturely and intelligently. (See "Notes" section below for further information).
- 2. You should attend at least one office conference, preferably during the first six weeks of the semester.
- 3. If you miss or are unable to attend class, it is **your responsibility** to contact me about your absence. I have many students, and my attention will always go first to those who are in class.

Manuscript Format

Use Times New Roman font, size 12, double-spaced, .5-inch indentation for paragraphs (do not use extra spacing between paragraphs), 1-inch margins all around, with page numbers preceded by your last name at top right, all pages stapled. Your name, instructor's name, class, assignment label, date, and word count should be double-spaced and aligned left at top of first page; title is centered (see Sample Assignments for correct formatting examples).

Assignment Requirements

- 1. You must submit all assignments on time unless you make prior arrangements.
- 2. You must submit all class papers to course assignment or discussion links on Canvas.
- 3. You must keyboard all out-of-class essay assignments.
- 4. You must successfully complete all assigned essays (including timed essays), a culminating paper, and a portfolio to pass the course.
