CRAFT PRACTICE

A few times this semester, we will learn some "craft" or sentence-level skills that you will practice and apply to your writing.

WORKING DRAFTS

Each major essay will have two drafts: Working Draft and Final Draft. When you submit your Final Draft for each, all other drafts will be included. This class will offer you the space, time and attention to actively work on these drafts throughout the semester.

REFLECTIONS

Be prepared to take time to write. You will also need to submit a "Process Reflection" for each essay in which you examine your drafts and reflect on the growth of your learning and writing processes.

- **2.** The unacknowledged use of another writer's ideas without proper citation. Borrowing all or part of another individual's work or using someone else's outline to write your own work.

- **3.** Copying another individual's computer printout and/or computer files and using it as one's own.
- **4.** Using an agency or Internet website engaged in the selling of term papers or other academic materials.

Disruptive behavior

Student behavior or speech that disrupts the instructional setting will not be tolerated. Disruptive conduct may include, but is not limited to: unwarranted interruptions; failure to adhere to instructor's directions; vulgar or obscene language; slurs or other forms of intimidation; and physically or verbally abusive behavior. In such cases where the instructor determines that a student has disrupted the educational process, a disruptive student may be temporarily removed from class.
