Catalog Description

Study argumentation and critical thinking in this second-semester composition course focused on reading and writing across multiple academic communities. Practice critical reading and research strategies, examine and evaluate primarily nonfiction texts, and craft responses through argumentative writing. Strengthen your information literacy and documentation skills and satisfy both the full-year composition and the critical thinking transfer requirements.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Analyze argumentative claims.
- 2. Respond to arguments with persuasive critical essays. Locate, synthesize, and document sources for use in response to arguments.
- 3. Demonstrate the capacity to read, analyze and evaluate non-fiction texts in support of academic inquiry and argumentation.
- 4. Utilize flexible strategies for writing expository and argumentative college-level essays.
- 5. Incorporate primary and secondary sources into essays using appropriate documentation format.

Course Materials: With the exception of *They Say, I Say*, which you need to buy, all reading materials will be provided in pdf form on Canvas. Additional materials such as electronic handouts, video lectures, and links will all be available on Canvas as well. The course is made of weekly modules that are easy to access and navigate.

Tell me right away so that I can correct any identified issues and make our learning as seamless and hassle-free as possible.

Coursework: Each week, you will be responsible for accessing Canvas to view the current schedule (located in the weekly modules) and plan ahead for a timely completion of the reading and writing assignments. Time management and organizational skills are absolutely essential in the online learning environment. All homework activities, class discussions, and formal papers build on one another and emphasize cumulative learning. You must then stay connected, informed, and on track. When in doubt, communicate with me directly and make sure you submit everything on time. Your own success in the course depends on it! Individual assignments must be uploaded to Canvas where they will be evaluated and graded according to published requirements. Students can monitor their own progress in the course by periodically checking their grades on Canvas and contacting the instructor when they have questions. As per CR English Department policy, extra credit is not available. Course grades are earned by fully participating in class and by successfully completing all required assignments.

Late assignment policy: Unless you request an extension ahead of time, late assignments will be marked down <u>one point</u> for each day they are late.

Please contact me as soon as possible if you are experiencing difficulty completing coursework, or if extenuating circumstances are affecting your participation. Communication is key.

Grading:

Presence, Attendance, and Weekly Assignments (280 points or 40%)

Each week students will read selected texts located on our Canvas site. You will have to print out the readings and actively engage with the text by annotating. Reading journals and discussion forum posts will be submitted on Canvas.

Formal Essays (420 points or 60%)

Students will complete TWO formal academic essays. Each essay will be between 7-10 pages of double-spaced text in size 12 Times New Roman font. Each essay will be composed in stages that are also referred to as The Writing Process, which may include prewriting exercises, drafts, revisions, research

assignments, editing and proofreading, and feedback along the way from instructors, peers, and consultants.

Assignment Feedback: Feedback will be available to students through various Canvas features including rubrics, comment bubbles, grading comments, and audio/video recordings. For additional verbal feedback in a one-on-one conference, you are encouraged to make a Zoom appointment with me.
