Manuscript Format

FOR ALL ENGLISH 1A WRITING ASSIGNMENTS: Use Times New Roman font, size 12, double-spaced, .5-inch indentation for paragraphs (avoid extra spacing between paragraphs), 1-inch margins all around, with page numbers preceded by your last name at top right, all pages stapled. Your name, instructor's name, class, assignment label, date, and word count should be double-spaced and aligned left at top of first page; title is centered—see the samples included with every assignment and use that formatting to get your papers in the appropriate format.

Assignment Requirements

- 1. You must submit all assignments on time unless you make prior arrangements. *Papers more than a week late will not be accepted and receive zero points.*
- 2. You must submit all class papers to course assignment or discussion links on Canvas.

- 3. You must keyboard all out-of-class essay assignments.
- 4. You must successfully complete all assigned essays (including timed essays), a culminating paper, and a portfolio to have a chance at earning a passing grade for the course.
