**Course Description:** This course is designed to focus on the designed to focus on the development of academic and personal skills necessary for students in college and beyond. It assists students with the transition between high school and college level expectations. Topics covered will be self-efficacy, creative learning, time management, academic skill enhancement, communication skills in a variety of environments, campus services and technology used in higher education.

# Student Learning Outcomes (as described in course outline):

- 1. Students will be expected to examine different learning processes and how these concepts of self-discovery can be applied to improve personal learning.
- 2. Students will be expected to demonstrate successful navigation through the use of college services and technology used in the college system.
- 3. Students will be expected to differentiate the expectations between a high school and college learning environment.
- 4. Students will be required to demonstrate active learning with responses to oral and written assignments.
- 5. Students will be required to complete a formal student education plan.
- 6. Students will increase self-motivation through goal setting exercises.

## In-class support network:

You will have general study assistants to help you with your assignments during this class. Please bring other coursework every day to work on during tutorial time. We will also have advising, career counseling, and other resources for this class.

### **Overall Grade/Points:**

Your grade is based on a total of  $\underline{1,000 \text{ possible points}}$  of which 630 points is for attendance, participation, and in-class work, 270 points for assignments, and 100 points for tests. Your grade is determined according to total points earned on the following scale.

#### **Grading Scale:**

A = 930 - 1000, A = 900 - 929, B = 870 - 899, B = 830 - 869, B = 800 - 829, C = 770 - 799, C = 700 - 769, D = 650 - 699, F = < 649. Note that anything under 65% is an F in this class.

### **Course Requirements & Grading:**

- 1. Attendance and Participation: Each day of class will count as <u>45 points</u> towards your final grade. Your attendance and participation will be the **most important factor** in passing the course (63%). Verbal communication is a key to success in college life and beyond. Students will be expected to actively engage in communication through constructive questions, ideas, and opinions. To receive full-points per day, students must come to class on time, complete any inclass assignments, and actively work on other coursework during tutorial times.
- 2. **Journal Entries:** Students must bring a spiral notebook or composition book to class for daily journal entries. You will respond to a journal entry prompt each day on the board. This is part of your participation grade.

Points can be deducted from your attendance/participation grade for the following:

Absence (-45 points)
Late to class (-10 points)
No journal entry (-10 points)
Late work (-10 points)

(Up to 1 week past due date and only for extenuating circumstances)

Not participating/working in class (-10...15 points)
 Behavior problem (#6) (-10...15 points)

- 3. **Presentation:** For <u>50 points</u>, each student will be asked to speak to the class for 5-7 minutes. You can share either a story of significance or something that had a significant impact on your life (positive or negative) and what you learned from it, or you can instruct the class on something in which you have knowledge or expertise. Please bring at least one visual aid such as a poster, picture, or authentic item to show. Using PowerPoint will earn you 5 extra credit points.
- 4. **Assignments/Exams:** In addition to the above presentation, you will have about ten to twelve other homework assignments worth 10-40 points each. Your presentation and assignments together are worth a total of 270 points (27% of your grade). As far as exams, you will have one quiz worth 20 points and two tests worth 40 points each (10% of your overall grade).
- 5. **Absences / Late Work:** You are allowed to make up one absence with an assignment worth 35 points, if you notify the instructor via email <u>prior to the absence</u>. Since we only have 14 class sessions, if you miss three or more classes before the 10<sup>th</sup> week (March 22<sup>nd</sup>), the instructor will drop you from the class. More than 4 absences will result in an "F" grade. Late work may be submitted up to <u>one week</u> late but only for extenuating circumstances and with 10 points deducted.

6. NO SIDE CONVERSATIONS DURING LECTURES OR WHEN ANOTHER SPEAKER OR STUDENT IS ADDRESSING THE CLASS. Cell Phones and other electronic devices must not be used, visible or audible in class. OTHERWISE, POINTS MAY BE DEDUCTED.

- If you personally decide to no longer attend the class you should officially withdraw from the course before March 29th. If you miss three or more classes before March 22nd, you will automatically be dropped from the course.
