

Class Participation

Students are expected to attend all lectures, as attendance is required. Participation is a critical part of the learning process and is closely associated with attendance. To be successful, you must participate. Participating, means showing up and speaking up. Showing up means being prepared and present for the entire class session. Speaking up means a) contributing to class discussions; b) engaging in class activities; c) completing assignments on time. Lack of participation and excessive absences will jeopardize the status of the student in that course objectives may not be met. For this reason, your attendance will affect your grade as follows:

- 0-2 absences No Deduction, positive bubble impact
- ≥3 absences Negative bubble impact

The only exception to this policy is for an emergency. In that case, you need to notify me in advance that you will be unable to attend class.

Teaching/Learning Methodologies

Student participation is critical to the overall success of the class. Active involvement in the learning process is essential. Instructors serve as facilitators of learning and engage students in a variety of activities to promote the acquisition of communication skills. If your final grade is on the "bubble" (e.g., 79% or 89%, class participation will be the deciding factor. Extra credit is at the Instructor's discretion.





Assignments

- Four quizzes No make-up quizzes will be administered. All quizzes are on-line through MyCR.
- Written Assignments are due at the beginning of class.
 - Success Journals There are 16 Journal Entries required and two Journal Entry Checkpoints. Journal Entries are to be turned in weekly at the end of class on Thursday (see the schedule below). Journal Entries will receive the maximum of 5 points each providing each journal is complete (meaning all steps in the directions have been addressed) and there is evidence of an attempt to <u>Dive Deep</u>. There are two Journal Entry Checkpoints. Journal Entries 1-5 are worth 2 points each and are due on July 15; Journal Entries 6-10 are worth two points each and are due on July 23. Total points for the entire Journal assignment is 100 points.

Your Success Journal provides an opportunity to explore your thoughts and feelings as you experiment with the success strategies presented in *On Course*. Although I will be collecting your journals and looking through them, please write for yourself, not me. Usually your journal entries will be written outside of class; however please bring both your textbook and journal to every class.

You have the option of submitting your Journal Entries electronically through MyCR. Journals are listed under the Assignments tab.

If you choose to work process your Journal Entries via computer, print and hand in hard copies of the entries when they are due (Journal Checkpoint dates) to get full credit. Then at the end of the class, bring all entries, organized in a three ring binder for the final Journal submittal.

Many students come to regard their journal as one of their most valued possessions.

- Student Education Plan (SEP) Meet with your counselor or advisor the week of July 21-24 to complete your Student Education Plan (SEP), and turn in a completed copy and earn 35 points. Deadline is end of class, July 24.
- For unexcused tardiness and unexcused absences, assignments submitted after class begins will be considered late. Late assignments will receive a 50% deduction. Any assignment turned in more than one week late will receive no credit. For excused tardiness and excused absences a minimum two-hour notification prior to class is required via e-mail. Quizzes and Final Project <u>cannot</u> be made up.





- Final Exam/Presentation Choose one of the following topics and prepare a class presentation (10 minutes) which includes at least one visual. (Powerpoint presentation is required). The essay and presentation are worth 75 points.
 - o Topic One: One Student's Story relate the story of how you used a specific *On Course* strategy to overcome an obstacle to your success in college or in life. Use the "One Student Story" essays in our textbook as models of how to write your story.
 - Topic Two: Personal Philosophy of Success Essay In this essay, you will present your own Personal Philosophy of Success, identifying the *On Course* success strategies that you will use for years to come. This essay is your opportunity to write the script that will keep you on course to a rich, personally fulfilling life.
 - o Powerpoint Presentation An approx. 10 minute presentation / summary of your chosen topic will be given to the class.
 - o A Topic One "A" paper will:
 - 1. Explain a specific obstacle the writer faced.
 - 2. Describe the specific *On Course* strategy used to overcome the specific obstacle
 - 3. Present the outcome of using the specific *On Course* strategy to overcome the specific obstacle the writer faced
 - 4. Show a commitment to excellence in preparation, including professional appearance and a command of standard English.
 - 5. The Presentation Evaluation Form will be used. (copy on MyCR)
 - A Topic Two "A" paper will:
 - 1. Offer the writer's personal definition of success
 - 2. Demonstrate the writer's careful consideration of three or more *On Course* success strategies that will be used to achieve success.
 - 3. Contain extensive support (examples, experiences, evidence, and/or explanation) for each strategy
 - 4. Show a commitment to excellence in preparation, including professional appearance and command of standard English.
 - 5. The Presentation Evaluation Form will be used. (copy on MyCR)
- Attendance is required for all presentations. There will be no make-up presentations. It is expected you will attend your fellow classmates' presentations as a professional courtesy – even if you have already completed your presentation.





Assignment, Quiz and Exam Blueprint

All quizzes are scheduled as on-line activities and are 25 points each. Quizzes are available on-line for several days. Missed quizzes cannot be made up without prior arrangements. Journal Entries are due at the beginning of the class period and have a cumulative value of 100 points. The Student Education Plan Assignment is worth 35 points and is to be submitted by July 31st. The Final Exam consists of a project and powerpoint presentation (75 points). Extra points are at the discretion of the instructor.
