Journals (220 points total)

Students can earn up to **10 points** for each journal that is turned in on time (see due dates above). The journal topics will be provided in class. Journaling is a way for you to reflect on your thoughts and experiences as well as topics in the coursework. Grammar and spelling errors will not be counted against you UNLESS they are distracting or confusing to the reader.

Reading Quizzes (200 points total)

Students will be tested on the reading assignments for this course. There will be a short quiz nearly every week. You are expected to bring your textbook to all class meetings and come prepared to discuss the reading that was assigned. You can earn up to **10 points** per quiz.

Class Participation (135 points total)

Students are expected to come prepared to discuss reading assignments. In addition, there will be in class activities and warm ups that will be an essential part of this course. Your contribution to discussion and intellectual discovery will make the class more rewarding for all. You can earn up to **5 points per class**.

Mid Term Essay – (20 points)

Students will write a 2-3 page essay on one of the topics below. Academic writing is expected and grammar and punctuation will be graded. If you are having trouble with the writing expectations, see me or your education staff to find out about tutoring services that may be helpful.

Option 1) One Student's Story

Using the format provided in the textbook you will explain how you used a specific strategy from the textbook to overcome an obstacle in your life **as a student.**

Option 2) Personal Philosophy of Success

Define success in your own words, utilizing three or more strategies described in the textbook. Show examples, experiences or other evidence to support your philosophy.

Mid Term Exam (125 points)

The mid-term exam will cover chapters 1-6 in the textbook.

Final Exam (150 points)

The final-exam will cover all chapters in the textbook.

Final Portfolio - (150 points)

Students will prepare a final portfolio to be turned in **on May 5**th. The portfolio folder will be discussed in detail throughout the class. Below are the components to be included in the portfolio:

- 1) 2 page Reflection essay How did this class affect you? What did you learn?
- 2) Mid-Term Essay (draft with corrections **and** final revision)
- 3) 2 Note-Taking Samples
- 4) Student Education Plan

Late Work

Students are expected to turn in work on the day it is due, per the course outline provided. Late work may be subject to up to a 20% reduction in points. If you are unable to turn in an assignment on time due to an emergency or facility "shut down" that is out of your control, you will have the opportunity to make up assignments within a reasonable amount of time as determined by the faculty and PB Education Dept. **No late work will be accepted after May 5th.**
