If you choose to word process your Journal Entries on a computer, print and hand in hard copies of the entries when they are due for full weekly credit (5 points for each completed entry). Many students come to regard their journal as one of their most valued possessions.

Grammar, spelling, and punctuation will **NOT** be factors in awarding points in for journal entries. Feel free to express yourself.
