Evaluation & Grading Policy

Each assignment has been given an equal amount of points value with all assignments weighted the same. This means that a journal assignment has the same amount of weight value as the midterm exam. The midterm exam is worth more points (It's equal to 5 journal assignments).

Course Assignments

Exploring your career and academic experiences and planning for the future: (100 points)

This assignment will ask you several questions about college and career interests and plans. It will help me know what tools and resources I can provide to help you get the most out of your college experience.

You cannot FAIL this assignment unless you do not answer the questions!

<u>Tests</u>: (250 points) Students may earn up to 50 points for tests 1, the Final Exam, and the Mid-term.

Test 1 will cover Chapters 1-3.

Mid-Term (Test 2) will cover Chapters 1-5.

Test 3/Final Exam see description below.

<u>Final Exam:</u> (50 points) Students will complete a final exam in class. It will be an exam that asks students to think critically about each of the topics we've covered in the class and to reflect on those topics. The format of the final exam will be a letter the students younger self describing all they have learned and really just reflecting on how this learning has changed your life.

<u>Journal</u>: (100 points) Journaling is a great way to reflect on one's learning, and set personal and academic goals. Students will complete a minimum of 10 (1 page each).

These journals should be about how you are feeling with what you are learning and how this learning makes you reflect on your past. It can be anything you want to write about with what you are learning during the reading. _

Each journal must be labeled with the the number journal it is and your name and your section number clearly stated on the page. Ex: (Journal #1, Danielle Carmesin, Section # 051490)

<u>Reading Quizzes:</u> (90 points) Students will complete one reading quiz per chapter (up to 10 points each).

<u>Vision Board Project</u>: (60 points) Students will demonstrate the knowledge of the 4 life roles that they have, and create personal goals with timelines about accomplishing their goals. The purpose of this activity is to reinforce a growth mindset and that in order to accomplish our goals, we must be specific, evaluate how our goals are different with each of our different roles, and that if we see a visual reminder that we've set specific goals, we can achieve them. The mind is the most powerful tool that we possess.

Personal Reflection Essay: (100 pts)

Paper Format:

Paper is to be 2 pages, uses MLA format and has correct grammar and punctuation, and complete sentences.

20 points possible

Paper Content:

All questions are answered and there is a clear introduction and conclusion.

30 points possible

Paper Style:

Paper shows a deep reflection and contains interesting and relevant personal insights. The paper is easy to reach and interesting.
