These assessments will include: polynomial, rational, radical, exponential, and logarithmic equations and functions.</p>

Review Course

This course covers material from MATH 120 (Intermediate Algebra). This review course is designed for students preparing to place into a transfer-level mathematics course. This is a CR/NC (credit / no credit) course based on participation on the course.

Course Work

- * A calculator (CR recommends the TI 83/84 series of graphing calculators)

Course Goals

1. If you are registered for, or cleared to take, MATH 30 next semester, and if you simply want to review, it is recommended that you complete all the exercise sets and receive passing grades (70% or better) on all quizzes at the end of each module.
2. If you would like to test out of MATH 120 and take MATH 30 next semester, it is recommended that you complete all the assignments and receive at least 80% on all quizzes at the end of each module. You will also be required to take a placement exam, which is offered outside of class. Based on the results, you will either be granted placement into MATH 30 or keep your current placement in MATH 120.
