Catalog Description

Math-15 is an introduction to basic concepts of descriptive and inferential statistics, with emphasis on the meaning and use of statistical significance. Students will use probability techniques to make decisions via hypothesis testing and will estimate parameters using confidence intervals. The course includes applications from a variety of technical and social science fields.

- 5. Judge the validity of research reported in the mass media and peer reviewed journals.

Welcome to Class!

Statistics is an incredibly relevant topic in our society. It is used in news, business, politics, academic research, and in every field that uses data. Understanding statistics will not only further your educational and career goals, but help you be an informed citizen and consumer.

You may be intimidated by this class, but don't worry! This is not your typical math class. *Statistics is about critical thinking*. At its heart, statistics uses data to answer questions. And even though it involves math, many people find that their intuition goes a long way in this class. *Statistics is best learned hands-on*.

Things You Should Know

Time Commitment

This class will keep you busy! We have asynchronous class lectures and a lot of homework. You should be ready to commit at least 12 hours per week to work. At the beginning it can feel a little overwhelming, but in the first few weeks you'll find your pace.

Math 15S – Co-requisite Support

This class is linked with a co-requisite support course Math 15S. Essentially the support course builds in more time into class each week so that we can learn statistics hands-on. We also address some other important skills. In order to be enrolled in this section, you must be enrolled in Math 15S as well. The Math-15S section in required and synchronous over Zoom and will meet Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7:30-8:55 pm.

Class Rules

As a general rule, be respectful to your classmates and help provide a healthy environment for learning. Give your full attention to the material or activities we are working on.

Grading

Canvas Exercises/Quizzes & Discussion Boards20%

Instead of using a textbook we'll be using an interactive course in Canvas that will give you readings and have you immediately work with the material. It will also require you to interact with problems in discussion boards which provide you a chance to work through a problem and then get/give feedback. Giving and getting feedback is critical to making sure you gain increased mastery of the material.

Canvas Checkpoint Quizzes20%

We'll have lots of medium sized Checkpoint Quizzes. At the end of each unit you'll have an online Checkpoint Quiz. The Quiz allows you three attempts, and we keep the best grade. *Quizzes are for learning*. It allows you to show how you're doing with the material, and give you an early alert if you're missing something.

Final Project......20%

Instead of a Final Exam, we will do a Final Project. There will be more information later about the Final Project but you will have multiple options on what to do and you should be able to find a topic that interests you.

Reading Reports......20%

There are some important parts of statistics we won't get a lot of time to discuss. Instead I'm assigning three possible books for you to read. You choose the book that you think you'll get the most out of, and you will give periodic written reports on the reading. I am also allowing an option to read news articles and reports involving statistics.

Participation......20%

You will be given credit for attending the online Zoom 15S sections. Additionally, you will send a paragraph for each asynchronous lecture stating what the lecture was about.

Falling Behind

Despite our best efforts, sometimes life gets in the way of school. Sometimes other classes end up requiring more work than expected, so school gets in the way of school! I've been there in both cases and have had to drop classes midsemester because I had too much on my plate. So I totally understand. I'm here to help you and don't feel like you owe me an apology for doing your best to balance your life. But let's assume the worst happens, and for some reason you fall behind...

If I notice that you are falling behind, I'm going to reach out by email and offer to help. But at some point you can get so far behind that there's no way you'll pass the class. If this happens, you can withdraw from the class. This means you get a W instead of an F on your transcript, which is much better for your GPA

- 2. In the event of an emergency, the responsible district employee on scene will:
 - a. Follow established procedures for the specific emergency as outlined in the College of the Redwoods Emergency Procedure Booklet.
 - b. Lock all doors and turn off lights if in lockdown due to an active shooter or similar emergency.
 - c. Close all window curtains.
 - d. Get all inside to safe location Kitchen area is best internal location.
 - e. If a police officer or higher official arrives, they will assume command.
 - f. Wait until notice of all is clear before unlocking doors.

- g. If safe to do so, move to the nearest evacuation point outside building (Pooky's Park), directly behind the Hoopa Tribal Education Building.
- h. Do not leave site, unless it has been deemed safe by the person in command. Student Support Services (required for online classes)
