Catalog Description

A course for students studying in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) fields and some areas of business. Both Math 30 and Math 25 (Trigonometry), are prerequisites for Math 50A (Differential Calculus). Topics include: polynomial, rational, radical, exponential, absolute value, and logarithmic functions; systems of equations; theory of polynomial equations; analytic geometry; arithmetic and geometric sequences and series. Note: Students without experience in Algebra II or Intermediate Algebra are strongly recommended to take Math 30S College Algebra support course concurrently.

- 1. Analyze and investigate functions and equations graphically, algebraically, and verbally.
- 2. Solve equations, systems of equations, and inequalities.
- 3. Apply functions and other algebraic techniques to model real-world applications.

Weekly Module Discussion/Activities

Your presence and participation in the weekly module discussions and activities is essential for making this class successful. Your participation informs me, and you, as to whether you are gaining an understanding of the material. They also provide an opportunity to build your understanding of and use of mathematical thinking and reasoning.

There will be 1-2 in each weekly module. Each will be worth 10 points. These cannot be made up nor completed after that week's module closes.

Online Homework

There will be a weekly online homework (using MyOpenMath linked through Canvas) for this class. Each will be worth 20 points. Here you'll be able to practice and get immediate feedback about how you are doing at understanding the mathematical content in each weekly module. I will accept these up to one-week late, however each question submitted correctly after the due date will receive 75% credit.

Weekly Synthesis

Each week there will be a weekly synthesis. These are like a cross between written homework and a take home quiz. With these you will be asked to connect concepts and mathematical skills, demonstrating you are learning the algebraic techniques and notation you will need as you continue your studies in STEM related fields. Each will be worth 20 points. You may turn them in up to a week late for at most 15 points.

Midterm and Final

There will be a Midterm just before Spring Break, the week of March 8th – March 12th. Make-ups are given at my discretion. The earlier you contact me with regards to the potential or actual missing of the Midterm increases your chances of being granted a make-up or being able to make other arrangements to take it.

If you miss the Midterm and are not able to make it up, or do poorly on the Midterm, your percentage on the Final will replace your Midterm score. **Your final will be given during the week of May 10**th – **May 14**th.

- 5. Follow established procedures for the specific emergency as outlined in the College of the Redwoods Emergency Procedure Booklet, (evacuation to a safe zone, shelter in place, lockdown, assist others if possible, cooperate with First Responders, etc.).
- 6. If safe to do so, notify key administrators, departments, and personnel.
- 7. Do not leave campus, unless it is necessary to preserve life and/or has been deemed safe by the person in command.

Klamath Trinity Campus Emergency Procedures

- 2. In the event of an emergency, the responsible district employee on scene will:
 - a. Follow established procedures for the specific emergency as outlined in the College of the Redwoods Emergency Procedure Booklet.
 - b. Lock all doors and turn off lights if in lockdown due to an active shooter or similar emergency.
 - c. Close all window curtains.
 - d. Get all inside to safe location Kitchen area is best internal location.
 - e. If a police officer or higher official arrives, they will assume command.
 - f. Wait until notice of all is clear before unlocking doors.
 - g. If safe to do so, move to the nearest evacuation point outside building (Pooky's Park), directly behind the Hoopa Tribal Education Building.
 - h. Do not leave site, unless it has been deemed safe by the person in command. Student Support Services (required for online classes)
