- 5. Analyze contemporary issues facing California and the US system of government.

Welcome to US Government & Politics, POLSC 10. The goal of this course is to give students a relevant understanding of how our complex government operates by describing the basic ideas, structure, and influences on our government and how politics work. This course addresses both philosophic roots and the contemporary operation of American national, state, and local governments. Specific topics include constitutional development, federal-state relations, and the rights and obligations of citizens under both the federal and the California constitutions. We also explore factors that influence our government: elections, political parties, the media, public opinion, and special interest groups. Students become familiar with policies, domestic and foreign, and how they are made. This course analyzes what is meant by American "politics". We discuss news events and connect them with the foundations, institutions, and political systems of our government.

Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course students will be able to:

- 1. Explain the history and philosophy of the Constitution, politics, and government in the US;
- 2. Identify the major provisions of the California and US Constitutions;
- 3. Compare the three branches of California and US Government, and related political institutions;
- 4. Outline the relationship between the states and national government (ie. federalism); and
- 5. Analyze contemporary issues facing California and the US system of government.

Format: The class is a combination of lecture, discussion, and activities.

Governing California in the 21st Century, 6th Edition

### **Expectations:**

**1.** On-time attendance is expected throughout the semester. Class begins at 8:20 and goes until almost 10:00. Please observe these times. Students who miss one third of classes will be automatically dropped.

**2.** Students are expected to take the midterm, the final, and quizzes on the schedule dates. Two assignments are required which are to be submitted in class before or on their specific dates. Do not submit these by email.

**3.** US Government & Politics is one of the most engaging classes offered at CR. It is a place where we can get together and discuss American politics. I consider this to be a rare and invaluable opportunity. Therefore, I ask all of us to honor the rights of others and to help maintain our class as a forum for thoughtful, respectful, and courteous true discussion. ### Grading:

**1. Frequent Quizzes – 30%** Quizzes are based on the texts, lectures, discussions, activities, videos: <u>everything</u> that we cover in class. They are short essay, multiple-choice, true/false, identification or a mix of these. Double Quizzes (2X) count as two. There are no make-ups. Let me know in advance if you need to take a quiz early. Quizzes are given at the <u>start</u> of class on <u>Tuesdays</u>. Please be aware that late arrivals will miss the quiz. The two lowest scores (or two missed quizzes) are dropped at the end of the semester.

2. Exams - - are primarily essay tests. They may include some questions that are of a quiz-like style.

- Midterm 25% The Midterm covers Chapters 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, and parts of 7 in the American Government text and sections of the California text. It is an essay exam, but also has some of the types of questions that are found on quizzes. Reserve Thursday, October 19.
- Final Exam 25% The Final covers chapters 4, 8, 9, 10, 11, and parts of 7 and 13 in the American Government text, sections of Governing California, and discussions held over the course. Its scope is somewhat cumulative in the essay section. The format is similar to the midterm.

Be absolutely certain to reserve **Tuesday**, **December 12 at 8:30** for our final.

**3.** Papers -20% Two papers are assigned and are expected to be submitted in class on or by the scheduled dates. Late submissions lose points. See instructions of each for details.
