Course Requirements and Grading

Students will be graded on attendance, performance on tests, class participation and class projects. Part of class participation includes acting appropriately as a responsible collaborator on group projects.

• Tests (275 points)

There will be three take home quizzes, one midterm and a final exam. The quizzes will consist of 25 multiple-choice items each worth 1 point. The first one will be a take-home study exam and will be designed to help you keep up with the reading. The second two are designed to test your understanding of the concepts rather than whether you read the material. They will be take-home as well and will be based on material covered in the book, lectures and video segments shown in class.

The midterm (100 points) will consist of 50 multiple-choice questions worth 2 points each, while the final exam (100 points) will include both multiple-choice and essay questions.

Late exams will not be accepted without exception

• Group Research Paper and Focus Groups (100 points)

You will be assigned a focus group where you will be given the opportunity to discuss topics and to engage in classroom activities related to the material presented in class. This group will also generate one research paper that will be presented to the class. The paper and presentation together are worth 100 points. Refer to research paper handout. **Please begin group projects ASAP after Midterm**. You will have 6 weeks to complete the project.

What if you don't want to work in a group? This is not an option unless there are serious and compelling reasons that you can demonstrate with documented evidence for being unable to participate.

This course will address content that is based on evolutionary (scientific) and cross-cultural models of behavior and will at times present controversial ideas and materials as they relate to the field of psychology. All opinions communicated by the instructor will be research-based. Because the fields of applied psychology and social psychology are closely interwoven with political events and decisions, we will explore how these areas of knowledge and politics mutually affect one another. Your grade will not be determined by your personal political beliefs and will be calculated based upon your performance in the class as evinced by your participation, ability to

analyze material, and all other criteria articulated in the syllabus. This class is geared towards adults; if you are not an adult you will be treated as one regardless of your age and under no circumstances will I speak with parents regarding your status in this class.

Speakers will be invited to speak to the class occasionally to highlight concepts. Their views are not endorsed by the college or by me, but are utilized to encourage class discussion.

This course will also address issues related to human sexuality (as it relates to human motivation), torture, racism, human genocide and war (as they relate to social psychological principles) and child rearing practices (human development). Images of the nude human body may be shown. A student enrolled in this course should be aware that this is a college level class.
