General Psychology Psych 1 – E1970 Spring 2013

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Course Description: Psychology is the scientific study of behavior and mental processes through the exploration of major theories and concepts, methods, and research findings. Topics include biological foundations, perception, learning, cognition, emotion, motivation, development, personality, social psychology, psychological disorders and therapies, and applied psychology. This course is transferable to four-year colleges and is a prerequisite for most upper division psychology courses. *Recommended: English 150*.

Student Learning Outcomes: (1) Analyze psychological research and synthesize information in writing. (2) Analyze how experience, culture, learning, and biology affect behavior and cognitive processes. (3) Demonstrate knowledge and understanding representing appropriate breadth and depth in selected content areas of psychological theory and research including: (a) biological bases of behavior and mental processes, (b) sensation and perception, (c) learning, (d) cognition, (e) personality, (f) social processes, (g) developmental changes, (h) psychological disorders, and (i) emotion and motivation.

Student Commitment: This three credit-hour class will require about nine hours per week of your time. You will have to regularly attend class – four or more absences is considered excessive, carefully read textbook chapters, submit thoughtful daily writing assignments, complete a research paper, and successfully demonstrate your learning in exams. Conscientiousness, attention to details, reading, writing, and study skills are critical.

Exams (41% or 200 points): Each exam will consist of 20 multiple-choice questions per chapter. After graded exams are returned, you can improve your score ½ point for each missed item by identifying the correct answer and text page. Corrections are due one week following the exam's return. You must take the exam at or before its scheduled date for full credit. Late exams are allowed up to one week with a 20% late penalty.

Lecture Points (17% or approx. 84 points at 3 points each class): Near the end of each class you will identify a topic from the lecture to respond and relate to your personal experience. Specifically, you will be asked to: Thoughtfully respond/react to the topic (1 point), relate/apply the topic to your own personal experience (1 point), and write a question you have based on the day's topic (1 point). You must attend the full lecture to receive credit.

Research Paper (21% or 100 points): This will be a short paper on any psychology topic of your choice including an outline (20 pts.), paper (50 pts.), and revised paper (30 pts.). Information is available using the Assignments link at the class website. Late papers are accepted one week after the deadline with a 20% late penalty.

Final Exam (21% or 100 points): The final exam will consist of 80 multiple-choice items based on chapters 12-15 and 20 recycled questions from prior exams. There will not be an opportunity to correct missed items. You must take the exam at or before its scheduled date. Late exams are not allowed.

Please Note: There are no extra credit assignments.
