In-Class Projects/Participation (5 points each)

In order for you to learn the material, it is important that you interact with it, by taking part in discussions and listening to the material being presented. I encourage you to ask questions and offer opinions on the subject matter. It is therefore also important that you be present at every class meeting. If you are not present at a class, please make every effort to get notes from another student.

There may be several in-class projects or papers worth five points each, which will be included as part of class participation. These projects or papers will be exercises designed to stimulate the use of psychological theories into real life applications. If you are absent when an in-class project or paper is assigned, we should talk.

The topics discussed in class will stimulate class discussions. Discussion will be an important time for learning. For this to happen in a comfortable environment, students need to be respectful of each other. College of the Redwoods has a student code of conduct outlining appropriate classroom behavior. Failure to comply with the code of conduct will result in a request to leave the class.

Research Article Assignment: (25 points each)

There will be four research article assignments. Students will provide a summary of a current peer reviewed scholarly journal article. The assignment will begin with an APA referenced format and include a section regarding the research question, hypothesis,

methodology, results, significance of research and a conclusion. The paper will be no longer than a two pages double spaced in APA format. A handout will be provided.

Quizzes: (25 points each)

There will be four quizzes throughout the semester on the material from the text. The quizzes will consist of 25 multiple choice questions worth one point each. If you are not able to make it to class on the day of the quiz please let the instructor know as soon as you are aware of this so that arrangements can be made. Make ups will not be given after the quizzes are graded and returned.

Exams: (100 points each)

There will be **three exams** and a **final exam** given during the semester. They may consist of multiple choice, fill in blank and short answer/essay questions. You must take the exam on or before the date of the exam. No make-up exams will be given after they have been graded and returned. In addition, an arrangement with the instructor is required in order to take the exam early.

Presentation: (50 points)

Each student will present to the class their viewpoint on an issue from *Taking Sides Clashing Views on Psychological Issues* on an assigned date. The presentation will include an overview of the issue and the individual's argument for their viewpoint on the controversy. Included in the discussion needs to be a research article that was found supporting your viewpoint. After the presentation a write-up of the argument and the article need to be turned in. The dates for the presentations will be assigned in class.

Annotated Bibliography: (50 points)

This bibliography needs to include all the sources that you have found in regards to your research questions. The annotation is a description of the source. Instructions for the assignment will be provided.

Research Proposal Paper: (150 points)

Early in the semester students will need to pick a topic for further research. Throughout the semester we will discuss articles that are being found on the topic. Topics may be provided or students may choose a topic of interest to create their research proposal. This assignment will allow you to follow the research process up to the point of collecting data.

Your research proposal will be the outline of how you would set up a research design for your research question. The following information and sections need to be included in your paper. The paper needs to be 3-5 pages long not including the title page, abstract, and reference page. The paper must be written in APA format.

- 1. Develop a research question.
- 2. Generate a research hypothesis.
- 3. Form operational definitions.

- 4. Choose a research design.
- 5. Evaluate the ethics.
- 6. Explain data collection techniques.
- 7. Discuss expected results and possible limitations.
