Several quizzes will be given throughout the semester without prior notice, in order to test for reading comprehension.

Grading Standards

Chapter Quizzes (5 points each)

Several chapter quizzes will be given before the start of the class and without prior notice. Quizzes will cover the chapter readings for the day and will consist of multiple choice, True/False, and/or fill in the blanks. The quizzes are designed to test chapter readings comprehension and to ensure lively and enriching discussions in class.

No quizzes will be given after the class takes the quiz.

Class Projects (5-50 points each)

There will be several in-class and/or homework projects or papers worth 5-35 points each. These projects or papers will be exercises designed to stimulate the use of psychological theories into real life applications. If you are absent when a class project or paper is assigned, you must get the assignment from a fellow student or e-mail or call the instructor.

Exams (50-90 points each)

There will be four exams consisting of multiple choice, True or False and/or essay questions. The first two exams will be worth approximately 88 points each and the third exam will be worth approximately 54 points and the final will be worth 25 points. The exams will test your knowledge of the assigned readings, lectures, and videos. You must take the exam at or before the scheduled date. There will be no exceptions, except for medical (with a doctor's note) or legitimate personal reasons.
