Course Description

A course focusing on the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. The content of the course focuses on the exploration of major theories and concepts, methods, and research findings in psychology. Topics include biological foundations, perception, learning, cognition, emotion, motivation, development, personality, social psychology, psychological disorders and therapies, and applied psychology. This course is transferable to four-year colleges and is a prerequisite for most upper division psychology courses.

- 2. Analyze how experience, culture, learning and biology affect behavior and cognitive processes.
- 3. Explain concepts in areas of psychological theory and research while representing appropriate breadth and depth of knowledge.

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Evaluation and Grading

Participation (20%) Regular attendance and class participation are keys to success in all your classes and this class is no exception. Please be sure that you keep up with the chapter readings and are prepared to take notes and to discuss the material in class. Group discussion and in-class exercises will make up an important part of your day-to-day experience in this course. *Please note the following policy related to absences*:

- Students who miss class before Census will be dropped from the course.
- Students who miss eight or more classes before the end of Week 10 will be dropped from the course.
- Students who miss four or more classes after Week 10 will receive zero credit for participation.
- Exceptions to this policy are made on a case-by-case basis and require at the least that you communicate to me the reasons for your absence.

Question Cards I keep track of participation and regular attendance using question cards. Students are responsible for purchasing a pack of 3-inch x 5-inch index cards (3X5, NOT 5X8). On each day, students turn in a card with your full name, the date, and a question that you have in response to the reading or the lecture. A card is due every day we meet for class except for exam dates and the date your paper proposals are due. Using the lined side of the index card, here is what the format for the very first card should look like:

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Follow this format for the rest. I'll keep the cards for my records. Even if you don't have a question, you should turn in a card because this is the way that I will be keeping role. No card, no record of attendance.

Exams (60%) You will take four exams during the semester. Exams will consist of a combination of multiple-choice, true/false, matching, sentence completion, short answer, essay, and/or other methods of assessment. Each exam will be taken in class on the day it is listed in the Class Calendar, is closed book and closed notes. You will have the entire class period to take the exams. Please bring a Scantron sheet and a Number 2 pencil to the exam. There are no make-ups for missed exams, but I will drop your lowest exam score (a missed exam = 0 and will count as your drop).

Term Paper (20%) Your term paper for this class will be on a topic of your choosing that has psychological relevance. The paper is to be written in two parts, a one-page proposal and a final draft. Each draft must be typed and properly formatted according to APA style, with the final draft approximately five pages in length (no less than four and no more than six). It is due at the end of the term. See the *Directions for Writing Your Term Paper* for more information.
