<p>A course focusing on the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. The content of the course focuses on the exploration of major theories and concepts, methods, and research findings in psychology. Topics include biological foundations, perception, learning, cognition, emotion, motivation, development, personality, social psychology, psychological disorders and therapies, and applied psychology. This course is transferable to four-year colleges and is a prerequisite for most upper division psychology courses.</p>

*Chapter readings should be done before the class meeting date. Reading the chapters beforehand is important in order to gain a better understanding of the lectures and discussions for that day/week. Several

quizzes will be given throughout the semester without prior notice, in order to test for reading comprehension.

Grading Standards

Chapter Quizzes (5 points each)

Several chapter quizzes will be given during class and without prior notice. Quizzes will cover the chapter readings and lecture for the day and will consist of multiple choice, True/False, and/or fill in the blanks. The quizzes are designed to test chapter readings and lecture comprehension and to ensure lively and enriching discussions in class.

No quizzes will be given after the class takes the quiz.

Class Assignments (5 points each)

There will be several in-class and/or homework assignments worth 5 points each. These assignments will be exercises designed to stimulate the use of psychological theories into real life applications. If you are absent when an assignment is assigned, you must get the assignment from a fellow student or e-mail or call the instructor. I will give you a handout of the guidelines for the assignments in class. If you are not in class when an in-class assignment is given, you will not be able to turn it in late and receive points, unless it is an excused absence.

Paper (Worth 25 points)

There will be one paper worth 25 points. It will be a reaction paper to a video we will be watching called, "The Medicated Child." More details on the rubric for the paper will be given to you when we watch the video.

Exams (15-88 points each)

There will be four exams consisting of multiple choice, True or False and/or essay questions. The first two exams will be worth approximately 88 points each and the third exam will be worth 50 points and the final will be worth approximately 15 points. The exams will test your knowledge of the assigned readings, lectures, and videos. You must take the exam at or before the scheduled date. There will be no exceptions, except for medical (with a doctor's note) or legitimate personal reasons.
