Course Description

A course focusing on the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. The content of the course focuses on the exploration of major theories and concepts, methods, and research findings in psychology. Topics include biological foundations, perception, learning, cognition, emotion, motivation, development, personality, social psychology, psychological disorders and therapies, and applied psychology. This course is transferable to four-year colleges and is a prerequisite for most upper division psychology courses.

- 1. Explain concepts in areas of psychological theory and research while representing appropriate breadth and depth of knowledge within the context of historical trends in psychology.

- 3. Demonstrate critical thinking skills and information competence as applied to psychological topics.
- 4. Analyze how experience, culture, learning, and biology affect behavior and cognitive processes.

- h. Do not leave site, unless it has been deemed safe by the person in command.

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ASSIGNMENT DESCRIPTIONS

Discussions:

Chapter Reflections

You will post a discussion in response to every chapter. Each discussion is worth 3 points. *Extra Credit Opportunity- You will receive one point for every discussion post you respond to within 1 week of the assignment. You may respond up to 3 peers' discussion posts for extra credit. You will NOT receive extra credit for responses unless you have completed your assigned discussion post.

Research Assignments:

APA Style Quiz- A quiz to help you identify proper APA style citations.

- Identify 5 sources You will find 5 sources from the library database on a topic of your choosing. You will list them proper APA style, using 12 point, Times New Roman font, double spaced.
- Research Paper Outline- This assignment will further your research assignments by outlining your final research paper. The Research Paper outline needs to include APA style headers (Abstract, Literature Review, Method, Results, Discussion, Conclusion, References)
- Annotated Bibliography- The Annotated Bibliography will expand on your "Identify 5 sources" assignment. In addition to listing the sources in APA style, you will briefly paraphrase the sources findings.
- Literature Review- This assignment will expand the literature review portion of your *research outline*. You will write a paper in essay form tying together all of the information you found on your topic. This information should be the same information from your *annotated bibliography*, but instead of listing it, you start to weave the information together in essay format. This assignment should be between 3-5 pages (including reference page)
- Experience Paper This assignment will expand on the method, results, and discussion sections of your *research outline*. You will fill in these sections of your outline to share a real life experience of the topic you chose to research. This assignment should be 2-4 pages in length.
- Research Paper- This assignment will combine the *Literature Review* paper and the *Experience Paper*. In addition to combining the essays you will add a "discussion" section analyzing the experience results with the lens of the literature review information, comparing and contrasting the life experience with literature findings. You will complete this paper by briefly summarizing the main points of your paper in a "conclusion" section.
- Presentation- You will present your research paper to the class. You may present through a power point, poster, or simply the telling of your findings. Your presentation should be between 5-10 minutes.

Exams:

Exam 1- This exam will cover chapters 1-9. The exam consists of 75 multiple-choice questions. Exam 2 This exam will cover chapters 10-17. The exam consists of 75 multiple-choice questions. Final Exam- The final Exam is a cumulative final, covering all 17 chapters of the book. The exam contains 150 multiple-choice questions.

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Late Policy:

Late work will not be accepted for full credit, unless previously arranged with the instructor. Your assignment grade will be reduced by 10% per day. After 10 days, you cannot receive credit for the assignment. This includes weekends and holidays, as many assignments can be turned in via canvas or email.
