Course Description

The scientific study of how thoughts, feelings, and behaviors, are influenced by the actual, imagined, or implied presence of others. Relevant research, theory, and practical applications will be covered. This course addresses social issues using current events to illustrate social-psychological constructs. Students will be given the opportunity to apply social psychological concepts to actual classroom experiences that demonstrate the social influences at play on behaviors and on internal cognitive events. The course canvasses the history of the field of social psychology. This is a college level course, and students will be expected to read and write at the college level.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Demonstrate the ability to identify and differentiate central processes of social cognition and their role in at least one of the following: the construction of self and identity, the experience of emotion, intimacy and attraction, group process, social influence, attitude formation and change, prosocial and aggressive behavior, and intergroup relations.
- 2. Analyze the impact of society and culture on human diversity, especially as it relates to gender, self and identity, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, sexuality, worldview, collective behavior, and/or values.
- 3. Demonstrate a familiarity with at least one of the findings from research in social psychology and the ability to apply them to hypothetical and/or real life situations found in a variety of contexts.

Issues addressed by course:

- 1. Explain the impact of society and culture on human diversity, especially as it relates to gender, ethnicity, and socioeconomic status.
- 2. The person/situation interaction and the multidimensional and probabilistic nature of behavior causality.
- 3. Prevailing factors that lead to social dominance and how those factors impact individuals.
- 4. How self-perception is modified by culture.

Skills: What students must have in order to demonstrate course outcomes?

- 1. Read and understand assignments
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge in quizzes, exams, papers and presentations.
- 3. Analyze and synthesize material presented in lecture, text, and discussions.
- 4. Apply social psychological knowledge to life situations.
- 5. Apply social psychological knowledge to personal experiences.

Textbook

As our primary text we will use Social Psychology, 9th Edition (Aronson, Wilson & Akert). Majority of our exam and quiz questions will be pulled from the textbook, oftentimes without being discussed in class. Chapter readings and comprehension are essential for doing well in this course.

Handouts, PowerPoint slides, assignments and study guides can all be found on Canvas under the files section. It's a good idea to access Canvas regularly to view recent announcements, hints, extra credit opportunities and updated grades.

Attendance (100 points)

Attending class is critical to obtaining a passing grade in this class, and you will receive 2 "free" unexcused absences, however, 15% (15 points) of the participation grade will be subtracted for each additional unexcused absence. Absences due to illnesses, when accompanied by a doctor's note, may be excused. If you know you'll miss a class, be sure to email me at least 48 hours in advance. To be clear, after **two** absences, there are no excuses for missing class unless it is a documented, serious and compelling reason. As a rule, if you are more than 15 minutes late for class (unless you have prior permission), you will be counted as absent. If you have questions about this policy, please ask.

Participation (150 points)

Throughout the semester, there will be opportunities to participate in structured class discussions, small writing assignments and other various activities. These small assignments are easy ways to earn points in the class and will assist with learning concepts from the material. They will be announced randomly in class and you must be present to earn the points. Late assignments for participation will not be allowed, no exceptions.

Review Crew (120 points)

Understanding and participating in groups is essential to social psychology, and it will be for this class as well. Twice during the semester, you will work with groups of your classmates to complete specific tasks related to the class. You will then individually evaluate yourself and your group members overall

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participation. All four tasks are due Sunday at noon, no exceptions. You must be present the day your group presents in order to earn all possible points.

Exams (350 points)

There will be 1 take-home midterm (completed on Canvas during spring break) worth 125 points, and a cumulative final worth 225 points. Exams cover material from lectures, class discussions, and review crew documents. Once scores have been entered, I do not allow students to keep exams, but you may come visit them during office hours (by appointment only) if you wish to review your work.

Writing Assignments (150 points)

You will be asked to complete 3 writing assignments in this course including an article review essay, and two news analyses. The article review essay, worth 100 points, will be a typed summary of a journal article from the approved list of social psychology journals. The news analyses, each worth 25 points, will be an examination of media messages, both "real" and "fake" new sources, and application to course concepts.

Quizzes (130 points)

Each week, you will have a brief quiz over that week's chapter. The quiz may vary in forms such as open book/notes, group, individual, short essay or multiple choice. The quiz may occur on either Monday or Wednesday, so it is best to come prepared Monday morning, with the appropriate chapter read.
