Social Psychology Catalog Description

The scientific study of how thoughts, feelings, and behaviors are influenced by the actual, imagined, or implied presence of others. Relevant research theory and practical applications will be covered. This course addresses social issues using current events to illustrate social psychological concepts. These issues include social disparities between groups and individuals as these relate to gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion, race, age, economic status, family status, and education. The course canvasses how social influences impact internal cognitive events and, thereby, shape behaviors. The course covers the history of the field of social psychology.

Student Learning Outcomes

Students will...

- **1.** Demonstrate the ability to identify and differentiate central processes of social cognition and their role in at least one of the following: the construction of self and identity, the experience of emotion, intimacy and attraction, group process, social influence, attitude formation and change, prosocial and aggressive behavior, and intergroup relations.
- **2.** Analyze the impact of society and culture on human diversity, especially as it relates to gender, self and identity, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, sexuality, worldview, collective behavior, and/or values.
- **3.** Demonstrate a familiarity with at least one of the findings from research in social psychology and the ability to apply them to hypothetical and/or real-life situations found in a variety of contexts.
- **4.** Demonstrate an understanding of research methodologies and tools utilized in social psychology including the experimental method, the quasi-experimental methods, the descriptive methods, and fundamental research instrumentation.

Points and Grading Scale

3 exams = Exam 1 (150 points) + Exam 2 (150 points) + Exam 3 -Final- (200 points) = 500 points

- Exams 1 and 2 will be comprised of 45 multiple choice and 5 short answer essay questions.
- The final exam will be comprised of 45 multiple choice and 5 short answer essay questions. The final exam will be noncumulative.
- ** I will allow students who come in up to 15 minutes late to take their exams, but I will not allow them any extra time to complete their exam. You will need one 882-E Scantron for each exam. Short answer essay questions will be completed on a separate sheet that will be provided at the time of the exam.
- 2 papers = Paper 1: Article summary and response (100 points) + Paper 2: Topic paper (150 points) = 250 points
 - Paper 1 will require you to read an academic article, synthesize it, and relate it to material you have learned in class and in your assigned readings. I will be providing a few articles for you to choose from to complete this 3-4 page paper assignment. Please only choose ONE of the articles to write your paper on and do not write your paper on an article that I did not provide. This paper will be typed, printed with the rubric attached, and in APA format.
 - Paper 2 is your opportunity to explore a topic or idea in social psychology that interests you. You will be required to locate 3-5 academic journal articles that relate to your topic and use them to describe and explain the topic or idea you're writing about. You may use your book as an <u>additional</u> source, but you must have at least 3 and up to 5 academic articles cited in your paper. This will be a 4-6 page typed, printed, APA paper with the rubric attached.
 - ** Rubrics for both papers will be posted to Canvas

10 quizzes = $(10 \text{ points each } \times 10) = 100 \text{ points}$

Quizzes will have 5 questions each, and they will be on the reading material and/or lectures for the week that
the quiz is scheduled. Since it is expected that you will have read the week's assigned chapter(s) before the
quiz date, you may be quizzed on items you have read about but that we have not yet touched on in lecture.
If we have covered any new material since the last quiz (even if it was during the previous week), that
material is fair game to be quizzed on. More information on quizzes can be found in the Evaluation and
Grading Policy section.

Participation = 150 points

 Participation is primarily based on attendance and engagement in class. Students who are disruptive or nonparticipatory may lose participation points after receiving a warning. Excessive student absences also impact participation points – see Policies for This Class: Class Participation and Attendance Policy for more details.

Note: Students can earn up to 16 points of extra credit by participating in class discussions on Canvas. Directions for receiving extra credit:

For 5 points of extra credit (can be done up to two times): Read and provide the title, source, and publication date of a current news article (can go back as far as 2018) from a reputable media outlet (choose from: BBC, Wall Street

Journal, NPR, New York Times, Reuters, or The Associated Press). Provide a one paragraph (3-5 sentence) summary of the article, and then write another 3-5 sentence paragraph applying that article to a concept we have discussed in class.

For 2 points of extra credit (can be done up to three times): Provide a 3-5 sentence paragraph response to a classmate's post. In this paragraph you may apply another concept learned in class to the article, respectfully disagree (and provide an alternative way of explaining the concept), etc. – just keep it class-related and civil.

*There is an example of what a post and response might look like on Canvas. Make sure that you are providing quality information that demonstrates thoughtfulness and careful application of course material. I will be monitoring and grading all extra credit on an individual basis and you may not receive full credit if I feel that you have not followed the above guidelines. You can comment on the same post more than once, but you will only receive credit once per post. You cannot reply on your own post and receive both forms of extra credit for doing so.

Policies for this Class

Class participation and Attendance policy

Roll will be taken during the class period. It will be up to my discretion at what time roll will be taken and the manner in which it is taken. At times roll, quizzes or class activities will count for the day's participation grade. You will be allowed two unexcused absences without penalty to your participation grade. For every absence after the two I am allowing, you will be deducted 10 points from your participation grade. Keep in mind that if you miss a **quiz** you cannot retake it. If you must miss an **exam**, you may make up ONE exam, but the make-up exam will be a different exam than the one the rest of the class is taking. To be eligible to take the make-up exam, you must notify me of your absence the day of the originally scheduled exam and the make-up exam must be completed in the Testing Center by our next class meeting. Note that this policy is ONLY for make-up exams and under no circumstances will any student be permitted to retake an exam. There are no exceptions.

Communication Guidelines

While I will try to answer your e-mails within a day, please allow up to 48 hours for a response. I may not check my e-mail during the weekend.

Policies - additional

There will be no make-up quizzes for this class. Late papers will be accepted with a 30% penalty for the first day late, with an additional 10% penalty for each day afterward. The late penalty will not go lower than 40% of the points originally available, but **all** late work must be turned in by **4/27/20**. ALL late Quizzes will be handed out during the first 5 minutes of class, and quizzes will be collected 10 minutes after the start of class. While I will hand you a quiz if you arrive within the first 5 minutes of class, I will not allow you any extra time to complete it.
