

Textbook

There is **no required textbook** for this course, as I will provide you with PDFs, links to online articles, and lecture slides. This content will be posted weekly under the Modules tab on Canvas, and you will find content organized by week. You will be responsible for reading through/watching ALL of the posted content for the week.

I will be regularly referencing content from Social Psychology (First Edition) by Catharine Sanderson, ISBN# 9780471250265. This is a recommended text and not a required one, but I'm listing it here in case you're interested in where some definitions and concepts are coming from.



Catalog Description

The scientific study of how thoughts, feelings, and behaviors are influenced by the actual, imagined, or implied presence of others. Relevant research theory and practical applications will be covered. This course addresses social issues using current events to illustrate social psychological concepts. These issues include social disparities between groups and individuals as these relate to gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion, race, age, economic status, family status, and education. The course canvasses how social influences impact internal cognitive events and, thereby, shape behaviors. The course covers the history of the field of social psychology.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

Students will...

- 1. Demonstrate the ability to identify and differentiate central processes of social cognition and their role in at least one of the following: the construction of self and identity, the experience of emotion, intimacy and attraction, group process, social influence, attitude formation and change, prosocial and aggressive behavior, and intergroup relations.
- **2.** Analyze the impact of society and culture on human diversity, especially as it relates to gender, self and identity, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, sexuality, worldview, collective behavior, and/or values.
- **3.** Demonstrate a familiarity with at least one of the findings from research in social psychology and the ability to apply them to hypothetical and/or real-life situations found in a variety of contexts.
- **4.** Demonstrate an understanding of research methodologies and tools utilized in social psychology including the experimental method, the quasi-experimental methods, the descriptive methods, and fundamental research instrumentation.

* There are no prerequisites or co-requisites for this course, but bear in mind that familiarity with basic psychological terminology may be helpful. I will NOT be expecting the class to have a background in psychology, but I will expect that students will read, and ask for clarification/help when they need it. Help is available, just ask!

Points and Grading Scale

3 exams = Exam 1 (150 points) + Exam 2 (150 points) + Exam 3 -Final- (150 points) = 450 points

- Exams 1, 2, and 3 (the final) will be comprised of 25 multiple choice and 5 short answer essay questions.
- ** The exams will be made available through the "Quizzes" tab on Canvas. Exams will be made available on Sunday by 12 P.M (noon) and will be open until 6 P.M on Saturday, giving you nearly a week to take exams at your convenience. The exception is the final exam, which will close on FRIDAY 12/18 at 11:59 P.M.

1 paper = Topic paper (150 points) = 150 points

- The Topic Paper is your opportunity to explore a topic or idea in Social Psychology that interests you. You will be required to locate 3-5 academic journal articles that relate to your topic and use them to describe and explain the topic or idea you're writing about. You may use your book as an <u>additional</u> source, but you must have at least 3 and up to 5 academic articles cited in your paper. This will be a 4-6 page paper in APA format. The paper will be submitted via Turnitin.
- ** Rubric for the paper will be posted to Canvas

16 Discussion forum posts (25 points each x 16) = 400 points

• Every week I will post a detailed discussion prompt in the "Discussions" tab on Canvas, and students are to reply to the prompt. Initial replies will need to be at least 175 words (approx. 2 paragraphs) and will need to answer all parts of the prompt. Your initial reply will be worth 15 points and your two replies (need to be solid, well-written paragraphs) will be worth 5 points each for a grand total of 25 combined points.

= 1000 points total

Note: Students can earn up to 20 points of extra credit by completing news article reviews on campus (worth 10 points each).

Directions for receiving extra credit:

For 10 points of extra credit (can be done up to two times): Read and provide the title, source, and publication date of a current news article (must be recent, going back no further than 2019) from a reputable media outlet (e.g. BBC, Wall Street Journal, NPR, New York Times, Reuters, or The Associated Press). Provide a one paragraph (3-5 sentence) summary of the article, and then write another 3-5 sentence paragraph applying that article to a concept we have discussed in class.

*There is an example of what a news article review might look like on Canvas. Make sure that you are providing quality information that demonstrates thoughtfulness and careful application of course material. I will be monitoring and grading all extra credit on an individual basis and you may not receive full credit if I feel that you have not followed the above guidelines.
