## **Catalog Description**

The content takes an integrative approach that includes the biological foundations and major theories: psychodynamic, behavioral, social cognitive, contextual (e.g., sociocultural), and cognitive. Topics include prenatal, infant, child, adolescent, and adult development.

#### **Assignment Descriptions**

#### Writing/Research

**Theme and Theory** (50 points) Pick a Developmental Theorist (Freud, Erickson, or Bronfenbrenner's) Describe the selected theory in your own words.

\* You will use your selected theory to examine and analyze your own experiences in later assignments, so choose a theory that interests you and that you won't be bored of later in the semester.

**Literature Review** (150 points) – In this assignment you will use the same information gathered from the three articles used in the annotated bibliography assignments. However, in this assignment the information will be written in an essay format comparing and contrasting the articles. The finished assignment should be 4-6 pages in length. A sample will be provided to you by your instructor.

**Method, Results, & Discussion** (150points) In this assignment you will continue the process of writing a research paper. Up until this point you will have written a literature review, the first half of a research paper. To complete this assignment, you will explain the method you used to gather data. You will be completing an autoethnographic research paper. That means you will explain in the *method* section that you collected data from your own story and describe your demographics. The *results* section of this paper will be the story/experience that you are going to analyze. It is important to share the story as it happened without any analysis, only the details belong in the results section. The *discussion* section is where the analysis of that story belongs. This is where you have freedom to complete you own analysis and compare and contrast the experience with that of the developmental lens you chose in your theme & theory assignment. You will be provided an example paper by your instructor. This paper should be 4-6 pages in length.

**Research Paper** (150 points) The final research paper will include your previously written literature review followed by your Method, Results, and Discussion paper. You are expected to correct any errors and incorporate feedback given to you from the previous assignments. You will add one final paragraph, the *Conclusion*, tying all of your paper together, resulting in a complete 8-12 page APA style Research paper.

#### Exams & Quizzes

#### Midterm (100pt)

The midterm exam will include 100 multiple choice questions on chapters 1-9.

### Final Exam(100pt)

The final exam will include 500. multiple choice questions on chapters 10-17.

**Chapter quizzes** (250 points) Each chapter will have a corresponding quiz consisting of 10-15 multiple choice questions. You are welcome and encouraged to write any thoughts, comments or questions you have about the chapter at the end of these quizzes
