Catalog Description

A course in the scientific study of abnormal behavior. Various theoretical frameworks to evaluate behavior will be presented including biological, psychological, and sociocultural approaches. An integrative survey of theory and research will be applied to psychological and cognitive disorders, including diagnostic criteria, prevalence, etiology, and treatment.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Analyze the differences between biological and psychosocial models in explaining the etiology, diagnosis and prognosis of abnormal behavior.
- 2. Analyze the historical, ethical, legal and societal concerns when defining abnormal behavior.
- 3. Describe the DSM classification system and discuss its strengths and weaknesses.

4. Analyze research in the area of abnormal psychology and synthesize information in a written paper.

Case Analyses (150): These assignments focus on case analysis and direct application of course concepts to the persons and situations presented in each case. These can be found in the required text 'Case Studies in Psychotherapy'. Each case will be unique and require you to critically analyze and apply concepts from the lecture and text, to thoroughly evaluate the presenting challenges. All analyses must take into account the legal and ethical considerations, as well as issues of culture and diversity that may pertain to the situations. *Outside research in culture is encouraged*. In addition, you will also be required to integrate knowledge from the 'Diagnostic and Stastical Manual, 5th Edition (Text Revision)(DSM-5-TR)' in your case presentation, learning how to recognize the presentation and classification of mental disorders.

Chapter Quizzes (75 points): Each chapter has a quiz consisting of 5 multiple-choice items based on the week's lecture/discussions, lecture videos, and text readings. Quizzes will be made available at the beginning of the week and will close at the end of the week. Refer to the assignment for that week incase you are unsure of beginning and due dates for quizzes. Each quiz will have 2 attempts allowed; your highest score will be the one that is calculated into your final grade. You need to ensure that you complete the quizzes before their due date as the will NOT be reopened except for the most extreme of circumstances (this does not include vacation or forgetfulness).

Exams (175 points): You will only have 2 exams this semester, a midterm (75 pts.) and a final (100 pts.). The final exam will NOT be cumulative and only consist of course material after the midterm. These exams will NOT be proctored or timed. You will only have one attempt per exam, please make sure you are in a quiet and comfortable area before you begin. You need to ensure that you complete both of the exams before their due date as the will NOT be reopened except for the most extreme of circumstances (this does not include vacation or forgetfulness).

Klamath Trinity Campus Emergency Procedures

- 2. In the event of an emergency, the responsible district employee on scene will:
 - a. Follow established procedures for the specific emergency as outlined in the College of the Redwoods Emergency Procedure Booklet.
 - b. Lock all doors and turn off lights if in lockdown due to an active shooter or similar emergency.
 - c. Close all window curtains.
 - d. Get all inside to safe location Kitchen area is best internal location.
 - e. If a police officer or higher official arrives, they will assume command.
 - f. Wait until notice of all is clear before unlocking doors.
 - g. If safe to do so, move to the nearest evacuation point outside building (Pooky's Park), directly behind the Hoopa Tribal Education Building.
 - h. Do not leave site, unless it has been deemed safe by the person in command. Student Support Services (required for online classes)
