

Catalog Description

A course in the scientific study of human development across the lifespan. The content takes an integrative approach that includes the biological foundations and major theories: psychodynamic, behavioral, social cognitive, contextual (e.g., sociocultural), and cognitive. Topics include prenatal, infant, child, adolescent, and adult development.

Course Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Analyze how biological, psychological, and social processes affect human development.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding representing appropriate breadth and depth in selected content areas of prenatal, infant, child, adolescent, and adult development.
- 3. Analyze and/or apply developmental research in writing.
- 4. Identify and describe classic and contemporary theories and research in lifespan psychology.
- 5. Identify and describe the techniques and methods used by developmental psychologists to study human development.
- 6. Identify possible causes or sources of developmental change and reasons for disturbances in the developmental process.

Course Format

This class is being taught in a face-to-face format but you will use Canvas to explore resources, download and access course materials (i.e., PowerPoint slides), take online quizzes, and submit assignments electronically. You should be visiting Canvas several times a week and receiving announcements. You can download the Canvas app for convenience. Please upload a photo of yourself! Please note that the course format is subject to change according to university guidelines as conditions around the COVID-19 pandemic change. Final Course Grade: The percentage in your Canvas grade book at the end of the semester is the grade you earned in this course. The corresponding letter grade will be documented on your transcript. Explanation of Course Components

Exams

There are 3 exams scheduled throughout the semester, 2 midterm exams and a final. Each exam is worth 50 points each. They cover the material from that section; the final is not cumulative. Dates and topics are shown on the Course Calendar at the top of Modules in our Canvas course.

Exams will be taken in class, and must be taken on the days they are scheduled. If you cannot take the exam that day for an unavoidable reason (illness, injury, emergency, etc), contact me as soon as possible so we can make alternative arrangements. **Missed exams cannot be made up**, unless we've made alternative arrangements. The final exam cannot be taken at a later date if missed, as the semester is over at that time.

Scores will be posted to Canvas as soon as they are evaluated.

DO NOT CHEAT! You can study together, but you must take the exam on your own and do not share answers. Cheating will result in a score of zero for all people involved.

Accommodations for Students via DSPS:

If you have documentation from DSPS that shows you need testing extensions or other accommodations, please let Professor Kandus know **during the first week of class** so we can better support you in accessing those accommodations.

Reading Quizzes

You will complete 10 Reading Quizzes for select chapters of the textbook and Required Readings. They are worth 10 points each, totaling 100 points of your overall grade. The Reading Quizzes can be found in the "Quizzes" tab in Canvas, and the chapters covered on each quiz are listed on the Course Calendar at the top of Modules. Quizzes open at the start of each week (Mondays at 12am) and are due by the end of that week (Sundays at 1:59pm). You have two 20-minute attempts per quiz. You cannot pause the quiz, so be sure to start it when you are able to complete it in one sitting. Your highest score will be kept.

As mentioned, you get two attempts per quiz. I suggest that you read the chapter and take your first attempt, then re-read the portions of the chapter that you need to review before taking your second attempt. You will be able to see which questions you missed, but you will need to figure out the correct answers to help you review. Late quizzes are not accepted.

Group Presentation

You will be working in groups of 2 or 3 to present on a topic related to developmental psychology. Around the middle of the semester you will form groups, then Professor Kandus will present you with a list of topics to choose from, and you will solidify your presentation date. You will then work with your group members throughout the rest of the semester to create and practice your presentation. All group members must be present on the presentation date to earn points on this assignment. If you must miss that day for an unavoidable reason such as an illness, injury, or emergency, contact Professor Kandus as soon as possible. A group contribution form will be completed at the end of the semester to assess the distribution of work and effort from each group member; lack of contribution to your group will result in a reduction of points from this assignment.

It is important to come to class to support your classmates while they give their presentations. Feedback from your peers can be incredibly beneficial as well. After you observe your classmates' presentations you will complete a Peer Evaluation Form for each presentation. You must be present during the presentations in order to earn points for this portion of the assignment.

The Group Presentation must be given during your assigned class period, and the Peer Evaluations must be completed and submitted during the presentation days, so the components of the Group Presentation are not accepted late. If you are not present on the day your group is presenting, you will not earn the points for the Group Presentation.

Components and Points for Group Presentation:

- Group Presentation = 125 points total
 - Presentation = 100 points
 - Group Presentation = 95 points
 - Group Contribution Form = 5 points
 - O Peer Evaluations = 25 points

Paper

You will complete one 10-page paper, as required by the department. This paper will be due on the last day of instruction. It will utilize APA formatting for the structure and citations. It is broken into three parts:

Part I: Discuss a developmental psychologist

- Part II: Reflect and apply a developmental concept to your life
- Part III: Summarize and cite an academic article related to developmental psychology

More information and the grading rubric can be found on its assignment page in Canvas, and will be discussed in detail in class.

Attendance & Participation

You can earn a total of 75 points from Attendance & Participation. These activities and discussions are designed to supplement the material you've read, watched, and learned during the semester. You will complete these activities and discussions during class, and the points cannot be made up if you are not present, so attendance is mandatory to earn these points. If you cannot attend class for an unavoidable reason (illness, injury, emergency, etc), contact me as soon as possible so we can make alternative arrangements if possible.

The Welcome Quiz and Movie Review also count as Participation Activities.

Your participation is sincerely welcomed in this class. The guidelines for this are simple. You are welcome to have your own thoughts on any subject we cover, and so are your classmates. Please don't pick on anybody in here. Back up claims with science and empirical evidence if needed. Respect one another and basic human rights. Racism, sexism, or any other discrimination will never be tolerated.

Extra Credit

You can earn up to a 2% bump in total grade, so 11 points max, from extra credit. All extra credit needs to be uploaded to the Extra Credit Assignments page on Canvas by the last day of instruction.

Out-of-Class Activities and Event Write-Ups (~2 points each): Throughout the semester I will announce activities and events that count for extra credit points. Many include online activities and workshops, since most of us are not able to attend public events yet. If you attend one of these, complete a one-page write-up including: a summary of the activity or event, something you learned or a new experience, and relate back to a concept from class. You can receive 2 points per write-up for most events; I will announce if an event is worth more points.

Movie Reviews: There are opportunities to watch movies/documentaries outside of class, then complete a one-page write-up summarizing the movie in your own words, relate back to the course, and discuss what you learned. Each movie review is worth 2 extra credit points.

Other options: There are sometimes other options for extra credit that come up throughout the semester. I will post all extra credit options under the "Extra Credit" section in the "Assignments" tab in Canvas.

Absence Policy

Attendance is important, you will do better if you come to class, so thank you for being here!

Four or more absences throughout the semester may result in a drop from the course. If you are going through an emergency, illness, etc that is interfering with your ability to come to class, reach out to me as soon as possible so I can work with you to figure out the best plan of action for your education.

IF YOU ARE SICK, DO NOT COME TO CLASS! Email Professor Kandus and we will make alternative arrangements that will not penalize your grade or result in a drop from the course.

Plagiarism: JUST DON'T DO IT! Plagiarism is presenting someone else's words, ideas, work, concepts, and/or beliefs as your own. Plagiarism is not tolerated in this course or at any college. If you plasgiarize, you will receive a 0 on that

assignment. If work is shared or copied from classmates, everyone involved will receive a zero. Read and analyze your sources, think critically, then paraphrase the material using your own words. Emphasis on writing in your own words! And do your own work.
