Catalog Description

A course focusing on the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. The content of the course focuses on the exploration of major theories and concepts, methods, and research findings in psychology. Topics include biological foundations, perception, learning, cognition, emotion, motivation, development, personality, social psychology, psychological disorders and therapies, and applied psychology. This course is transferable to four-year colleges and is a prerequisite for most upper division psychology courses.

- 2. Recognize and understand the impact of diversity on psychological research, theory and application, including (but not limited to): age, race, ethnicity, culture, gender, socio-economic status, disability, and sexual orientation
- 3. Demonstrate critical thinking skills and information competence as applied to psychological topics.
- 4. Analyze how experience, culture, learning and biology affect behavior and cognitive processes.

Course Format

This class is being taught in a face-to-face format but you will use Canvas to explore resources, download and access course materials (i.e., PowerPoint slides), take online quizzes, and submit assignments electronically. You should be visiting Canvas several times a week and receiving announcements. You can download the Canvas app for convenience.

NOBA Textbook: In the interest of keeping your education affordable, your textbook is free! To access NOBA, click on the link on the Canvas Course Materials page (http://noba.to/qyh367m2). Be sure to view our course textbook and not the entire textbook, as the entire textbook has about twice as many modules. Our course textbook is titled "Introduction to Psychology" with my name, Julia Kandus, below the title. Bookmark this page for easier access throughout the semester. Utilize the optional ungraded quizzes at the end of each module for extra practice. Reading quizzes posted to Canvas are graded.

Scantrons: You'll need 4 Scantron Form 882-E. These are the long skinny forms, with 50 multiple choice questions on each side. Other forms aren't compatible. They can be purchased at the bookstore. Please keep these forms flat and unwrinkled.

You will also need a #2 pencil for the exams.

Final Course Grade: The percentage in your Canvas grade book at the end of the semester is the grade you earned in this course. The corresponding letter grade will be documented on your transcript. Be sure to put time and effort into this course to attempt to earn the grade you desire. Professor Kandus simply inputs the grade you earned in this course.

Explanation of Course Components

Exams

There are 4 exams scheduled throughout the semester, 3 midterms and a cumulative final. The midterms are worth 50 points each, and cover the material covered in that section (see course calendar for chapters and sections). The final is worth 100 points, and is cumulative, covering all the material from the semester. The exams total 250 points of your final course grade. There will be 50 questions on the midterms and 100 questions on the final. Questions include true/false, multiple choice, matching, and labeling. Exam dates and topics are shown on the course calendar. You will need a Scantron SC882-E and a #2 pencil for **each** exam (so 4 Scantrons total). Exams are taken in class, and **must** be taken on the day they are scheduled. To reduce academic

dishonesty, exams will not be returned to students, but you can visit your exams during office hours. We will also go over the most-missed questions after each exam. Scores will be posted to Canvas as soon as they are evaluated. Missed exams cannot be made up, except in the most serious of circumstances. In those events, documentation may be required. The final exam cannot be made up.

Accommodations for Students via DSPS:

If you have documentation from DSPS that shows you need testing extensions or other accommodations, please let Professor Kandus know **during the first week of class** so we can better support you in accessing those accommodations.

Reading Quizzes

These reading quizzes contribute 100 points toward your course grade. The reading quizzes can be found under the "Reading Quizzes" section in the Assignments tab on Canvas. Before I lecture on each topic, read the chapter on NOBA that corresponds with the quiz that week (see the course calendar) and begin studying using the quiz. Then, review the material often, making sure you have reached mastery of the material before the due date. After you've reviewed the chapter(s), retake the quiz to test your retention of the material. You can take each quiz 2 times, and your highest score will be recorded in the gradebook.

You will complete 10 chapter quizzes for select sections of the NOBA textbook. Quizzes open at the start of each week and are due by the end of each week, after you've already read the chapter, and we've gone over the material in lecture. They are due on Sundays by 11:59 p.m. on the weeks that the quizzed material was covered. As stated above, you can take the quizzes up to 2 times within the week they are available to ensure retention of the material. Your highest score for each quiz will be recorded in the gradebook. See the quiz schedule on the course calendar (check Canvas for updated version). Since you have an entire week and two attempts per quiz, late quizzes are not accepted.

Out-of-Class Assignments

There will be 5 out-of-class assignments due throughout the semester. These assignments supplement what we are working on in class, and will further your understanding of the concepts and material covered in class. See the course calendar for due dates. Some details of assignments are below, but you can find more details on the assignments' page on Canvas and we'll discuss them in class. Late Out-of-Class Assignments lose 10% of their total points per day late.

- 1. **Welcome Survey (5 points):** This assignment is designed so I can get to know your names, a bit more about you, and to ensure you know how to upload assignments to Canvas. Upload a document (Word, pages, etc...) to the All-About-You assignment page under the Assignment tab on Canvas. See the assignment page on Canvas for more details and due dates.
- 2. **Analyzing Research & APA Formatting (60 points):** We utilize the American Psychological Association (APA) formatting while writing reports, articles, etc in the field of psychology. This is different than the MLA formatting you may be used to. We will go over APA formatting in class, then you will complete this assignment in which you will read an empirical article, summarize it in your own words, and provide citations. APA formatting is used in all psychology courses and careers, so it is incredibly important that you become familiarized with it.
- 3. **Make A Brain! (60 points):** You will gain experience with brain anatomy and functions by making your very own brain using household items. Be creative and have fun with it! You will share your brain with the class. We will discuss this in more detail in class, and instructions will be provided on Canvas.
- 4. **Stress Reduction Activity (25 points):** After learning about stress reduction techniques, including self-care activities, you will participate in a self-care activity outside of class. You will then write a brief write-up of the activity for points, since the activity itself is really the beneficial part. More details in class and on Canvas.

5. **Psychological Disorders Assignment (50 points):** We do not diagnose ourselves, friends, family members, etc while we are learning about psychological disorders in this or any of your undergraduate courses. We need to leave that to the trained professionals. However, it is great practice to apply these disorders to fictional characters from movies, TV shows, and books. You will create a presentation (PowerPoint, Keynote, etc) with examples of 10 different characters depicting 10 different psychological disorders. More details in class and on Canvas.

Attendance & Participation

You can earn a total of 50 points from Attendance & Participation. These activities and discussions are designed to supplement the material you've read, watched, and learned during the semester. You will complete these activities and discussions during class, and the points cannot be made up if you are not present, so attendance is mandatory to earn these points. If you cannot attend class for an unavoidable reason (illness, injury, emergency, etc), contact me as soon as possible so we can make alternative arrangements if possible.

Your participation is sincerely welcomed in this class. The guidelines for this are simple. You are welcome to have your own thoughts on any subject we cover, and so are your classmates. Please don't pick on anybody in here. Back up claims with science and empirical evidence if needed. Respect one another and basic human rights. Racism, sexism, or any other discrimination will never be tolerated.

Extra Credit

You can earn up to a 2% bump in total grade, so 12 points max, from extra credit. All extra credit needs to be uploaded to the Extra Credit Assignments page on Canvas by the last day of instruction.

Out-of-Class Activities and Event Write-Ups (~2 points each): Throughout the semester I will announce activities and events that count for extra credit points. Many include online activities and workshops, since most of us are not able to attend public events yet. If you attend one of these, complete a one-page write-up including: a summary of the activity or event, something you learned or a new experience, and relate back to a concept from class. You can receive 2 points per write-up for most events; I will announce if an event is worth more points.

Movie Reviews: There are opportunities to watch movies/documentaries outside of class, then complete a one-page write-up summarizing the movie in your own words, relate back to the course, and discuss what you learned. Each movie review is worth 2 extra credit points.

Other options: There are sometimes other options for extra credit that come up throughout the semester. I will post all extra credit options under the "Extra Credit" section in the "Assignments" tab in Canvas.

Absence Policy

Attendance is important, you will do better if you come to class, so thank you for being here!

Four or more absences throughout the semester may result in a drop from the course. If you are going through an emergency, illness, etc that is interfering with your ability to come to class, reach out to me as soon as possible so I can work with you to figure out the best plan of action for your education.

assignment. If work is shared or copied from classmates, everyone involved will receive a zero. Read and analyze your sources, think critically, then paraphrase the material using your own words. Emphasis on writing in your own words! And do your own work.
