Catalog Description

A course focusing on the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. The content of the course focuses on the exploration of major theories and concepts, methods, and research findings in psychology. Topics include biological foundations, perception, learning, cognition, emotion, motivation, development, personality, social psychology, psychological disorders and therapies, and applied psychology. This course is transferable to four-year colleges and is a prerequisite for most upper division psychology courses.

Assignment Descriptions

Writing/Research

APA Style Quiz 50 points –This quiz will consist of short answer and multiple-choice questions asking you to demonstrate your working knowledge of writing in APA style, properly citing sources, and formatting paragraphs.

Annotated Bibliography (50 points each) – In this assignment you will be asked to cite articles in APA format. The Annotated Bibliography form and article to be cited will be provided to you by the instructor.

Literature Review (150 points) – In this assignment you will use the same information gathered from the three articles used in the annotated bibliography assignments. However, in this assignment the information will be written in an essay format comparing and contrasting the articles. The finished assignment should be 4-6 pages in length. A sample will be provided to you by your instructor.

Exams & Quizzes

Midterm (150 pt)

The midterm exam will include 75 multiple choice questions on chapters 1-7.

Final Exam(150 pt)

The final exam will include 75 multiple choice questions on chapters 8-15.

Chapter quizzes (150 points) Each chapter will have a corresponding quiz consisting of 10 multiple-choice questions. You are welcome and encouraged to write any thoughts, comments or questions you have about the chapter at the end of these quizzes.
